

Hopes & Wisdom for Santa Fe's Families

This time of year always brings a familiar softness—a season filled with tradition, reflection, and the quiet hope that accompanies a fresh start. I feel it more deeply each year as my kids grow. It seems like just yesterday I was nine months pregnant with Aviva, resting and waiting, only for her to arrive early on a cold Sunday afternoon in January. Now she is turning six, and I'm reminded how quickly time moves and how precious these seasons with our children truly are.

Just a few weeks ago, she lost two teeth and looked up at me with complete

seriousness to ask, "Is the Tooth Fairy real?" It was one of those small moments that catches you by surprise—the kind that reminds you how quickly childhood unfolds, how their questions shift from magical to practical almost overnight. And it made me think about the world she is growing into, and the hopes we carry as parents for the city that surrounds her.

As I prepared to write this New Year's message, I asked my daughter, "What do you hope for Santa Fe?" She answered without hesitation. "I hope people are

more kind," she said. "And that people help each other more."

Her words brought me back to the heart of community. It is built day by day through small acts of care—and local government is one of the ways we organize that care. It helps us pool resources, coordinate efforts, and take on challenges that none of us could solve alone.

Santa Fe is a place where history, culture, and community run deep. Long before it became the oldest state capital in the nation, these lands were

home to indigenous communities who lived, learned, worked, created, and raised their families here for thousands of years. That deep and continuing presence enriches Santa Fe and reminds us of our shared responsibility to care for this place with intention and respect.

Today, Santa Fe is not only a world-renowned tourism destination; it is also a community filled with remarkable resources for families. We have Santa Fe Community College supporting lifelong learners and career pathways. We have arts and music organizations like the Queen Bee Music Association,

Dragonfly Art Studios, and the Santa Fe Children’s Museum nurturing creativity and confidence. We have the Santa Fe Teen Center offering a place for young people to connect, explore, and grow. And countless nonprofits, educators, coaches, mentors, and volunteers pour their hearts into making this city vibrant for every generation.

As Santa Fe prepares for 2026, mayor-elect Michael Garcia has gathered his transition team and now steps into a profound responsibility for our city’s future. Recent charter changes mean the mayor now votes only to break ties, so our strong mayor–council system will rely more than ever on thoughtful collaboration. Together, the council and mayor will share responsibility for setting priorities, overseeing services, and ensuring that our city government reflects the values and needs of our community.

Santa Fe is at a meaningful point of transition. With a new mayor and a strengthened council, the structure of our city government asks us—more than before—to lean into collaboration. We are a community of artists, educators, longtime families, recent transplants, faith communities, nonprofits, and small-business owners. No single perspective defines us. Our shared future will be shaped not only by policy decisions, but by how openly we listen to one another. Families, especially, bring a grounded perspective—one rooted in daily realities and long-term hope.

And families know these needs well:

We hope for a Southside that feels just as safe, welcoming, and well-resourced for working families as the Plaza feels polished and inviting for our visitors.

We look forward to smoother roads as we drive kids to school, dance rehearsals, drum lessons, basketball practice, and everything in between—especially along Cerrillos, Old Airport Road, and Agua Fria.

We imagine parks and public spaces that are clean, vibrant, and ready for every season of childhood; places where kids can swing in the crisp air on snowy mornings, skateboard after school, picnic in summer, or start a spontaneous game of tag.

We value public facilities—our libraries, rec centers, and gathering places—and hope they continue to feel accessible, welcoming, and well cared for, like the Genoveva Chavez Community Center.

We look toward a compassionate, coordinated approach to homelessness that supports dignity, strengthens community health, and helps keep families and neighborhoods safe.

We hope for an economy that grows with our children; one that creates good jobs and opportunities so future generations can build their lives here and choose Santa Fe as their lifelong home.

And we hope our tax dollars are stewarded wisely, building long-term stability and opportunity for the generations who will inherit this remarkable city.

These are the fundamentals. The everyday things that determine whether a city is not just beautiful, but genuinely livable. When they work well, the rest of Santa Fe’s magic has room to flourish: its creativity, its cultural richness, its economy, its thriving nonprofit community, its educators and artists and youth programs, its sense of place and belonging.

Raising a child here reshapes the way you see the city. The places I once passed without much thought—playgrounds, libraries, trails, after-school arts programs—have become markers of the world Aviva is growing into. Her curiosity and joy make me pay attention in a new way. When she asks why a road is bumpy, or why a park gate is broken, or why someone is sleeping outside in the cold, I am reminded that our children absorb everything. Their questions become ours. Their futures depend on the choices we make today.

As we enter this new year, Tumbleweeds hopes to elevate the voices of those who know Santa Fe most intimately: parents, caregivers, and families. These everyday realities—roads, parks, safety, housing, opportunities—are exactly what our next mayor and council need to understand from you.

What hopes and wisdom would you share with Santa Fe’s next mayor?

What changes or improvements would help make this a better city for your children to grow, learn, and thrive?

Your hopes—large or small—are part of the fabric of this city. Maybe you dream of safer crosswalks near your child’s school. Maybe you hope for more teen programming, improved mental health resources, cleaner parks, or more career opportunities so your children can envision staying in Santa Fe when they grow up. Ring in a New Year

Think New Mexico looks toward what’s merry and bright for our education system

Education leaders, advocates, and stakeholders agree that there’s never been a better time to meet the moment for New Mexico’s education system. The opportunity to lead the way in multicultural education comes on the heels of the urgent need to address concerns that wait not so patiently at our doorstep: academic and social learning time lost post-pandemic, teacher shortages in math, science and special education, student mental health and disengagement, the need for improved culturally relevant teacher and administrator preparation, and the Martinez-Yazzie consolidated lawsuit, to name a few.

New Mexico has seen some investments starting to pay off. However, the return

on those investments has been slow. Statewide reading proficiency has crept up to 44% across all grade levels with a 10% increase overall since 2022. This is a result of millions of state and federal dollars being allocated for teacher training, coaching, summer school, and \$30 million for a new literacy center to be located in Albuquerque.

Math levels remain stagnant at 25%, with special education students only reaching 8.5% proficiency and for English learners reaching only 9.8%.

While test scores offer a narrow snapshot of our students, we know there is still much work to be done. It will require collaboration and coalition building, targeted funding, accountability, and a

consistent and shared vision of what is possible statewide.

The good news is that we already have promising models coming online throughout the state that refocus efforts on meeting basic student needs and moving students toward more relevant learning and life skills. For example, innovative staffing models attempt to move away from the one teacher, one classroom model while offering teachers support with collaboration and in classroom coaching. Work-based learning and career and technical education continue to offer hands-on experiences. Both receive funding but could be better studied statewide to determine student impact.

A state program will pay unhoused high school students \$500 a month if they maintain a 92% monthly attendance rate, complete all their school work, and participate in academic counseling. The students will also take financial literacy courses each month from partnering banks.

And on that note, 49 out of 89 school districts have made financial literacy a graduation requirement. Think New Mexico has built a coalition of banks, credit unions, nonprofits, state leaders, and educators committed to making learning relevant while supporting teachers along the way, including offering free training to financial literacy teachers from across the state.

Training for school board members is also a focus for the state. Think New Mexico is working with partners like the New Mexico School Board Association to make more varied opportunities available to board members, while also increasing the quality and expanding content to help board members make informed decisions on budgets, policies and accountability for their return on investments.

The challenge is to monitor success and scale up to ensure equitable access to relevant learning experiences, especially for our rural students and those populations named in the Martinez-Yazzie lawsuit: students with special needs, low-income students, English learners, and Native American students.

This fall the state has been under court order to develop an action plan to address what the courts have deemed as the state's failure to provide an adequate public education for our students in those four named groups. The nearly 200-page comprehensive plan addresses four critical areas: equitable access to high-quality instruction, equitable access to well-prepared culturally and linguistically responsive educators, equitable access to academic, social, well-being and behavioral services and effective funding, support and accountability to drive systemic improvement.

Many advocates and content experts believe the plan still falls short on metrics, specific budget allocations, and specific actions. The plaintiffs and their partners have also asked for inclusion in the process of building a plan together.

In the meantime, the legislative process rolls on and the proposed budget from the PED includes increases in key areas such as professional development, tutoring, and community schools, including:

- \$16.5M for teacher, administrator, and school board training (an increase of 9%)
- \$35M for summer programs and in-school tutoring (an increase of 21%)
- \$7M for community schools (an increase of 16.7%)
- \$5M for high-impact tutoring (an increase of 400%)
- \$7.7M for STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math), artificial intelligence and outdoor classrooms (an increase of 15.6%)

The Legislative Education Study Committee (LESC) and the Legislative Finance Committee also put forth proposed education budgets, which will all be considered before a final budget is approved during the next 30-day legislative session that begins in January.

The LESC, made up of legislators from the Senate and the House of Representatives, is considering endorsing the following legislation for the upcoming session:

Attendance Provisions for Students with Severe Medical Conditions: This would amend the Attendance

for Success Act to ensure students with disabilities are not penalized for absences related to services outlined in their Individualized Education Program (IEP), such as for medical appointments or hospitalization. It also directs the Public Education Department to issue guidance on allowable absences to protect students receiving necessary medical care.

Comprehensive Approach to Math Instruction: This proposal creates a statewide framework for math instruction, including early screening and intervention plans. It also would require timely notification of learning needs to parents. By the 2027-2028 school year, districts must implement professional learning plans aligned with these new state standards to improve student outcomes.

Allowable Responses to Student Behavior: This bill strictly defines permissible restraint and seclusion practices and prohibits dangerous methods such as chemical or prone restraint. It allows physical restraint only when there is an imminent danger of serious physical harm and enhances training and reporting requirements for school staff.

Literacy Instruction and Supports: The High-Quality Literacy Instruction Act mandates that all K-12 literacy instruction and interventions use materials grounded in the science of reading. It also establishes a reading assessment system, parent notification requirements for reading difficulties, and a coaching model for schools with low reading proficiency.

Office of Special Education: This legislation codifies the Office of Special Education within the Public Education Department to enforce laws and ensure consistent services for students with disabilities from birth through college transition. It establishes a deputy secretary of special education position and requires annual reporting on the status of special education statewide.

Suspension of Individual School Board Members: This proposal authorizes the

Public Education Department Secretary to suspend individual school board members for willful failure to perform duties or misconduct, offering a targeted alternative to suspending an entire board. The bill establishes due process rights for the accused member and limits the secretary's interim power to voting only in the event of a deadlock.

Increasing the Employer Share of Health Insurance Premiums: Beginning in fiscal year 2027, this bill requires all school districts and

charter schools to contribute at least 80 percent toward the cost of employee health insurance premiums. The initiative requires a state appropriation of approximately \$73.2 million and mandates a study on the future sustainability of public school insurance programs.

Strengthening Teacher Preparation and Residencies: This bill updates the Teacher Residency Act by tying resident stipends to statutory minimum teacher salaries and allowing participants to fulfill their service commitment at any public school in New Mexico. It also clarifies that partner districts are expected, but not required, to hire residents upon completion of the program.

A celebrar el Año Nuevo

Think New Mexico se enfoca en lo que es alegre y prometedor para nuestro sistema de educación.

Líderes educativos, promotores e interesados coinciden en que no ha habido mejor momento para enfrentar el sistema educativo de Nuevo México. La oportunidad de abrir el camino en educación multicultural sigue muy de cerca la urgente necesidad de abordar los problemas que esperan, no tan pacientemente, en nuestras puertas: el aprendizaje académico y social pospandemia, la escasez de maestros de matemáticas, ciencias y educación especial, la falta de atención a la salud mental del estudiante y su desconexión con la escuela, la necesidad de mejorar la preparación de administradores y maestros en aspectos culturalmente relevantes y la consolidación de

la demanda Martinez-Yazzie, para nombrar unos cuantos.

Nuevo México ha visto el buen resultado de algunas de sus inversiones. Sin embargo, el beneficio de esas inversiones ha sido lento. A nivel estatal, la competencia en la lectura ha subido al 44 por ciento en todos los niveles de grados, con un aumento del 10 por ciento desde el 2022. Este es el resultado de millones de dólares estatales y federales asignados para la capacitación de maestros, entrenamiento, escuela de verano y \$30 millones para un nuevo centro de alfabetización situado en Albuquerque.

Los niveles en matemáticas siguen estancados en el 25 por ciento, con

estudiantes de educación especial que sólo llegan a un nivel de capacidad del 8,5 por ciento y para los que aprenden inglés, solamente del 9,8 por ciento.

Mientras que las calificaciones en las pruebas ofrecen una imagen limitada de nuestros estudiantes, sabemos que todavía queda mucho trabajo por hacer. Tomará la colaboración y la formación de coaliciones, financiamiento orientado a sectores específicos, asunción de responsabilidades y una visión compartida y consistente de lo que es posible a nivel estatal.

Lo bueno es que ya tenemos modelos prometedores en línea por todo el estado que reenfozan esfuerzos en

satisfacer las necesidades básicas de los estudiantes y orientarlos hacia un aprendizaje más relevante y destrezas para el diario vivir. Por ejemplo, innovadores modelos de dotación de personal que tratan de alejarse de aquel de un maestro, un salón de clases, mientras que ofrecen a los maestros apoyo con colaboración y entrenamiento en el aula. El aprendizaje en el medio laboral y la educación técnica y de carreras profesionales siguen ofreciendo experiencias prácticas. Ambas reciben financiamiento, no obstante podrían estudiarse mejor a nivel estatal para determinar el impacto en los estudiantes.

Un programa estatal pagará \$500 mensuales a estudiantes sin vivienda si mantienen una asistencia del 92 por ciento mensual, completan su trabajo escolar y participan en asesoría académica. Los estudiantes también tomarán cursos de educación financiera mensualmente, ofrecidos por bancos asociados con el programa.

A propósito, 49 de 89 distritos escolares incluyen la educación financiera como un requisito para graduarse. Think New Mexico ha formado una coalición de bancos, cooperativas de crédito, organizaciones no lucrativas, líderes estatales y educadores comprometidos a crear un aprendizaje relevante mientras apoyan a los maestros sobre la marcha, incluso al ofrecer capacitación gratuita a los maestros de educación financiera por todo el estado.

Entrenamiento para los miembros de la junta directiva escolar es también un enfoque del estado. Think New Mexico trabaja con colaboradores, como la Asociación de directivas escolares de Nuevo México, para ofrecer a los miembros de las directivas más oportunidades, al mismo tiempo que se aumenta la calidad y se expande el contenido para ayudarlos a tomar decisiones con conocimiento de causa sobre presupuestos, políticas y asunción de responsabilidades por su rendimiento.

El reto está en supervisar el éxito y el apoyo para asegurar un acceso equitativo a experiencias de aprendizaje relevantes, especialmente para los estudiantes de áreas rurales y poblaciones mencionadas en la demanda judicial Martinez-Yazzie: estudiantes con necesidades especiales, estudiantes de bajos ingresos, estudiantes que aprenden inglés y estudiantes nativoamericanos.

En el otoño, el estado estuvo bajo una orden judicial para desarrollar un plan de acción con el fin de tratar lo que los tribunales consideran como el fracaso del estado en proveer una educación pública adecuada para nuestros estudiantes en esos cuatro grupos mencionados. El plan completo de casi 200 páginas se refiere a cuatro áreas críticas: acceso equitativo a un alto nivel de calidad en la instrucción, acceso equitativo a educadores bien preparados y cultural y lingüísticamente sensibles, acceso equitativo a servicios académicos, sociales y de bienestar y conductuales y un financiamiento efectivo, apoyo y asunción de responsabilidades para impulsar una mejora del sistema.

Muchos promotores y expertos de contenido creen que el plan todavía carece de medidas para evaluarlo, asignaciones financieras determinadas y acciones específicas. Los demandantes y sus socios también han solicitado inclusión en el proceso de crear un plan juntos.

Mientras tanto, el proceso legislativo sigue adelante y el presupuesto propuesto del Departamento de educación pública, (PED, por sus siglas en inglés), incluye aumentos en áreas claves, tales como el desarrollo profesional, tutoría y escuelas comunitarias, entre ellos:

- \$16,5M para la capacitación de maestros, administradores y miembros de la directiva escolar (un aumento del 9%)
- \$35M para programas de verano y tutoría en las escuelas (un aumento del 21%) • \$7M para escuelas comunitarias (un aumento del 16,7%)
- \$5M para tutoría de alto impacto (un aumento del 400%)
- 7,7M para STEAM (ciencias, tecnología, ingeniería, arte, matemáticas, por sus siglas en inglés), inteligencia artificial y salones de clase al aire libre (un aumento del 15,6%)

El Comité legislativo de estudios educativos (LESC, por sus siglas en inglés) y el Comité legislativo de finanzas también propusieron presupuestos de educación, los cuales se considerarán antes de aprobar el final durante la próxima sesión legislativa.

El LESC, integrado por miembros del senado y de la cámara de representantes, tiene bajo consideración respaldar las siguientes propuestas en la próxima sesión:

Disposiciones de asistencia para estudiantes con condiciones médicas serias: Esto enmendaría la Ley de asistencia para el éxito, con el fin de asegurar que los estudiantes con discapacidades no se penalicen por ausencias relacionadas con los servicios indicados en su Programa de educación personalizado (IEP, por sus siglas en inglés), tales como citas médicas u hospitalizaciones. También instruye al Departamento de educación pública a emitir pautas sobre ausencias admisibles para proteger a los estudiantes que reciben atención médica necesaria.

Enfoque amplio a la instrucción de matemáticas: Esta propuesta crea un marco estatal para la instrucción de matemáticas, que incluye una prueba temprana y planes de intervención. Igualmente, requeriría una notificación oportuna a los padres de familia sobre las necesidades de aprendizaje del estudiante. Para el año escolar 2027-2028, los distritos deben implementar planes de aprendizaje profesionales alineados con estos nuevos estándares estatales para mejorar los resultados de los estudiantes.

Respuestas permitidas al comportamiento del estudiante: Esta propuesta define estrictamente las prácticas de restricción permitidas y prohíbe métodos peligrosos, tales como sustancias químicas o restricción prona. Permite restricción física únicamente cuando hay un peligro inminente de daño físico grave y aumenta los requisitos para reportar y la capacitación del personal escolar.

Instrucción educativa y apoyo: La Ley de instrucción de alfabetización de alta calidad ordena que toda instrucción e intervención de alfabetización de los grados K-12 utilice materiales basados en la ciencia de la lectura.

También establece un sistema de evaluación de la lectura, requisitos de notificación a los padres de familia por dificultades en la lectura y un modelo de entrenamiento para las escuelas con baja competencia en la lectura.

Oficina de educación especial: Esta propuesta de ley codifica la Oficina de educación especial dentro del Departamento de educación pública para hacer cumplir las leyes y asegurar servicios consecuentes para los estudiantes con discapacidades desde que nacen hasta la transición a la universidad. Establece un puesto de subsecretario de educación especial y requiere reportar anualmente la situación de la educación especial en todo el estado.

Suspensión de un miembro de la directiva escolar: Esta propuesta autoriza al secretario del Departamento de educación pública para suspender a miembros de la directiva escolar por incumplimiento intencional de sus deberes o falta de ética profesional, y ofrece una alternativa específica para suspender una directiva completa. La propuesta de ley establece derechos de debido proceso para el miembro acusado y limita el poder provisorio del secretario para votar solamente en caso de un punto muerto.

Aumento a la parte del empleador de la prima de seguros de salud: A partir del año fiscal 2027, esta propuesta requiere que todos los distritos escolares y escuelas charter

contribuyan por lo menos un 80 por ciento del costo de las primas de seguro médico de los empleados. La iniciativa requiere una asignación de fondos estatales de aproximadamente \$73,2 millones y ordena un estudio sobre la sostenibilidad futura de los programas de seguro de las escuelas públicas.

Fortalecimiento de la preparación de maestros y residencias: Esta propuesta actualiza la Ley de residencia de maestros al vincular los estipendios de residencia a los salarios mínimos reglamentarios y permite a los participantes cumplir su compromiso de servicio en cualquier escuela pública de Nuevo México. También aclara que se espera, pero no se requiere, que los distritos socios contraten residentes al completar el programa.

How to make fitness goals stick this year

Every year, most of us make a resolution to get fit, healthy and at our best through exercise by either joining a gym, walking or running, or some other type of exercise. We may even go for a few months exercising or starting a training program, but we soon fall back into old habits. I have some tips for you below on how you can stick with your exercise or training program and improve your strength, endurance, flexibility, cardiovascular health, and bone density, and lower your risk of many illnesses.

First, set your why: Why do I want to work out? Write it down and continually refer to it. Set some SMART goals that are Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-bound. Instead of saying “I want to get fit,” try “I will lose 18 pounds in three

months by doing cardio and resistance training for 55 minutes three times a week. Start slow, and set realistic goals. Measure your progress and don’t give up if you falter here and there. Keep a journal of the exercises you perform and your progress. Make your goals achievable and choose activities you enjoy, so it’s not a chore and turns into a lifestyle. Choose exercises that are relevant to you, and set your workouts up like an appointment—set specific days and times you want to exercise. You can do this by getting a friend to work out with you or hold you accountable. You might want to try using a personal trainer to help keep you on track and motivated, and mix up your exercises to keep things interesting such as strength training, cardio, flexibility, and hiking our great trails.

In addition to setting your SMART goals for working out, there are five things you can do to help you get in better shape. The first is getting seven to eight hours of sleep each night. Sleep is crucial for muscle repair, growth, and overall recovery. During this time, your body releases growth hormone, rebuilds muscle tissue damaged during exercise, and restores energy, which is essential for preparing your body for your next workout. Without sufficient sleep, you risk decreased performance, increased fatigue, and slowing recovery time.

The second is lowering any stress you have. Stress negatively affects your workouts by causing issues like fatigue, reduced focus, and decreased coordination, which can impair performance and increase the risk of injury. It can also slow down recovery and negatively impact muscle repair and growth due to hormonal changes like elevated cortisol levels.

The third is getting the right amount of hydration—specifically water each day. You need 0.5 to 0.75 ounces of water per pound of body weight each day. Drinking the right amount of water before, during, and after exercise is crucial for performance and health, because it regulates body temperature, lubricates joints, supports muscle function, and prevents dehydration. Proper hydration boosts endurance, prevents muscle cramps, and helps your body recover more effectively, while even mild dehydration can significantly decrease performance

and increase the risk of heat-related illness.

The fourth is proper nutrition. A proper diet helps your workouts by providing the necessary fuel for energy, supporting muscle repair and growth, and aiding in recovery. Eating balanced meals with the right mix of carbohydrates, proteins, and fats gives you the energy to perform, while protein helps rebuild muscle fibers after exercise.

And the fifth is exercise. Exercise improves health by strengthening the

cardiovascular and musculoskeletal systems, managing weight, and reducing the risk of chronic diseases like heart disease, type 2 diabetes, and certain cancers. It also provides mental health benefits, such as boosting mood, improving sleep, and enhancing cognitive function and memory. Regular physical activity helps control blood pressure, cholesterol, and blood sugar levels, and can increase energy levels and improve overall well-being.

I have been working out for more than 40 years and consider myself to be physically fit. When I first started, it was tough. I didn't always want to go to the gym, but I got a workout partner and once I saw improvements I was hooked. I just felt better.

As I have aged, I continue my workouts and have added balance and stability exercises to my resistance training and cardio. It really has become a lifestyle. I soon became a certified personal trainer and fitness instructor through the National Academy of Sports Medicine. I primarily work with seniors and tennis athletes at my home gym called Santa Fe Senior Fit. I also instruct fitness classes and personal training at Quail Run and various senior living facilities. Too often, I see people wait until they have an issue or can't do the things they like to do when they were younger. Even then, exercise at any age can be beneficial in improving strength, balance and flexibility, plus reduce your risk of many diseases. I encourage

you to start exercising now and make this a lifestyle.

As you start an exercise program, start slowly and progress from there. You want to see small victories and celebrate them. Remember to focus on your why. This will help you stay motivated and on track. I would map out at least a three month goal. Write down what you want to accomplish and how you will measure your progress. If you want to walk, start with 10 minutes a day, progress to 20 minutes and eventually 30 minutes a day. Or for a more vigorous exercise, I would suggest hiking. Santa Fe has so many nearby trails to choose from and you can see Mother Nature close up. If strength training is your choice, start with seated exercises for 12 to 20 reps and progress from there to standing exercises using dumbbells and cable machines. There are many forms of exercises and types of equipment to use, so choose what is relevant to you and fits into your why. I wish you well on your journey to better fitness and health.

WELCOMING WINTER WITH OPEN ARMS

Judy's STEM Jam — connecting science and math to life, learning, and play

Get ready for a fun filled excursion and pack layers of warm clothing, including coats, gloves, and boots, along with winter-themed books and a plan for enjoying indoor and outdoor activities. Be prepared to explore the scenic winter wonderland of Northern New Mexico with its unobstructive views.

Why is winter a favorite season? It is distinctive with its crisp, invigorating cold air, offering opportunities for cuddling up in cozy places and sipping hot cocoa complete with marshmallows, playing games, and enjoying beautifully illustrated children's books.

Winter is a time to spark children's curiosity and imagination as they discover new things and ponder the "I wonder" questions. The Caldecott book *Owl Moon* by Jane Yolen sets the stage for winter as children generate mental images of a young daughter and her father going owling at night. The cover tells it all and is a good place to start. Together they discover the magic of winter while walking wordlessly on the pristine snow that blankets their path. The silence is deafening, as only the father's whoo-who-who echoes through the fresh chilly air. Repeated readings of this beautiful story rooted in themes of family, quiet magic, and owls will result. Sounds like a wonderful plan for taking your family on a night walk to see if you find owls and hear their calls. On other winter walks, look for animal tracks and

compare the shapes, sizes, and depth of the prints in the snow.

Opportunities abound with sequencing the story events, role playing characters, investigating figurative language, and finding answers to why owls are nocturnal (appear at night), about their habitats (where they live), what they eat, and what they look like? The questions are almost endless. Grab some construction paper, markers, and scissors and create images of owls with simple shapes of circles and triangles, then tape them to a window to see the winter landscape. On Post-It notes write words and/or phrases, prompted by the frame “Owls can ..., have ..., are”

For families who are more adventurous, examine owl pellets (available at pelletlab.com/shop/pellets). They tell their own ecosystem story. Pellets are undigested materials of fur and bones that owls and other raptors (birds of prey) regurgitate. Dissecting pellets requires observation skills, patience, and hand washing before and after to puzzle out what was eaten, try building food chains and skeletons from the materials and bones found in them. For more information about owls, read *White Owl*, *Barn Owl* by Nicola Davies.

Can you imagine a winter without snow? The soft carpet under our feet, gently covers the silhouettes of trees standing stately as living sculptures, and hides fallen leaves. If not, *The Story of Snow* by Mark Cassino is for you as is *Snowflake Bentley*, a Caldecott book by Jacqueline Briggs Martin. Having a snow sensory bin available with white rice, cotton balls, and small toy animals will generate more ideas regarding snowy environments.

Did you know that a snow crystal begins as a speck and forms into a six-sided shape? These authors take a complicated topic and make it easy to understand starting with the speck that gathers water vapor. Wilson “Snowflake” Bentley was the first to photograph snowflakes (1885) and to view their unique shapes (symmetry) with a technique he developed.

Take a deeper dive into fun snowflake crafts with a square piece of paper (or coffee filter), fold it into a triangle, cut off the edges, and see the resulting design; arrange Q-tips, pipe cleaners, or popsicle sticks in snowflake shapes on paper and add paint and sequins for color; have paper snowflake races by attaching pieces of metal to the snowflakes and use small magnets to move them along, the winner is the one that crosses the finish line first (ask: does the size and/or shape of the snowflake make a difference? If so, why?); or analyze real snowflakes using a magnifying glass and compare them to pictures of real ones. For more ideas go to stemactivitiesforkids.com/winter-stem-with-snowflakes/. *The Snowy Day*, a Caldecott book by E. J. Keats features simple pleasures of winter, making snow angels, knocking snow from tree branches, and thinking of ways to save snowballs.

What do you remember about winter? I remember sledding down steep hills and streets, ice skating, holding

hands with friends and playing whip on a frozen lake (yes, I was the tail), and winning snowball size challenges (using a string to check the circumferences). Take a stroll down winter memory lane with your children with Kim Norman’s *Ten on the Sled*, a playful rhyming countdown, to see how many of the ten Arctic animals stay aboard going down a hill.

More winter STEM learning continues with measuring snowfall, building snow forts and mazes outdoors and indoors (with blankets and large blocks) fostering spatial, scale, and design thinking, blowing snow bubbles close to the ground made with warm water, dish soap, and sugar and watching them freeze before they pop, and painting murals on snow with pray bottles of water and food colorings. Don’t forget to collect scoops of clean snow for easy sweet treats. Enjoy snow cones, homemade ice cream

with snow (cup of milk, ½ cup sugar, and vanilla stirring until creamy), and slushes made with favorite juices or maple syrup.

How do animals like whales keep warm in cold water? It’s all about their blubber; it acts like a built-in winter coat preventing body heat from escaping. Conduct a simple investigation and find out how insulation works with kitchen items, rubber gloves, Crisco, ice, Ziplock bags, thermometers, bowls, and ice. For directions, go to bit.ly/4iyRYed.

Our reading continues with Lizann Flatt’s *Sizing Up Winter*, framed in nature using a whimsical approach that gets children to look more closely at engaging illustrations of frozen rivers, snow tracks, and icy lakes with snowy owls, polar bears, and river otters for children to measure capacity, distance,

mass, and time as they become more relatable concepts.

Now let’s go to the subnivean zone in Kate Messner’s *Over and Under the Snow*. Reading the lyrically rich text captures the beauty of winter to find out who lives, sleeps, hides, and plays there. Continue with Jane Simmons’ *Waiting for Winter* about how animals prepare their barrows and dens to huddle in and stay warm. *The Little Fern’s First Winter* by the same author features Mama Rabbit and little ones, introducing another natural habitat.

Keep track of your family’s (including pets) winter experiences; make a list and revisit it in April. Did you spend time outside, take walks, dream up snowy and frosty fun stories, think about people’s and animals’ resilience, write inspirational poems and songs about clouds, and view Mars, Jupiter, Polaris, and the constellation Orion in our night sky? For updated information, see timeanddate.com.

Winter is a special time for bundling up and leaning into cozy curiosity. Embrace the value of reading together and thrive in every environment, from the warmth of the toasty indoors to the crisp outdoors. Make lasting memories and look forward to the next exhilarating adventure—because the weather forecast shouldn’t stop your family from enjoying the season to the fullest.

SERVING UP CONFIDENCE

What coaching middle school volleyball reveals about patience, parenting, and joy

Volleyballs bounced in every direction across the middle school gym, propelled by the exuberant—if not exactly coordinated—efforts of sixth- and seventh-grade girls. Most were brand new to the sport. I spotted my eldest daughter, Maya, tossing a ball in the air with the same brand-new determination.

“I can help out a couple of days a week,” I told the coaches, who stood armed with clipboards and good intentions. By the end of that first week, I’d attended

all five practices. And for five years, I’ve added a new roster to my clipboard each fall season.

I originally volunteered to spend more time with Maya at her new school—and, truthfully, to keep an unobtrusive but protective eye on our oldest child. It was a no-cut program; I wasn’t coaching the Williams sisters. But it quickly became so much more.

I knew volleyball, even earning all-state individual honors in high school. I loved other sports, too—soccer, basketball, track, tennis—but volleyball had always been special. My hands remembered the game, even after years away. But coaching, like mothering, takes far more than technical skill. It requires patience, intuition, organization, creativity, humility, and

a sense of humor sturdy enough to survive a dozen middle schoolers.

That’s one reason why I recruited other moms to help. “I am not the kind of person who ever thought I’d enjoy coaching anything,” said my assistant coach, Marcie. “But I guess being a mom of two has given me patience I didn’t used to have.” She and I had once been high-school teammates and found ourselves on the sideline

coaching our daughters through an undefeated season.

They say it takes 66 days to form a habit. Our middle school volleyball “season” is closer to 25 practices lasting just over an hour. When repeatedly passing the ball backward more often than forward, despite multiple drills and encouragement, it’s frustrating but ok. They’re beginners. The point is to learn.

The White House Press Corps has nothing on inquisitive and empowered sixth-grade girls setting their pre-game expectations. Eventually a coach has to cut them off or you’ll never practice. They may scrape together only a few successful serves in a game, but every single girl shows up in uniform, ready and excited to play. You can’t teach that kind of enthusiasm.

Middle schoolers are also master negotiators when it comes to conditioning drills. No one likes conditioning, but purposeful conditioning gives strength and grit that carries beyond the sport. “I really improved this season,” one player wrote me. “Even though we had to run a lot.” A victory, all around.

Time-outs don’t always have much to do with the game. Sometimes you realize you’re not so different from the kids you’re coaching. One of my sixth graders told me she didn’t mind watching football in the rain because “only good things happen when it rains.” When I asked what she meant, she smiled wistfully and said, “In movies, rain is always a good memory. It’s so romantic.” The competitive coach in me melted. Apparently, I also have the romantic heart of a sixth-grade girl.

Coaching requires preparedness. My backpack rivals Mary Poppins’s carpet bag: first aid kit, chalk for measuring reach, floor dots to mark serve zones, spare jerseys, and extra knee pads. (The extras must be kept secret, or the girls won’t make a habit of remembering theirs.) By season’s end, only a couple of lonely hair ties remain.

But preparation is more than gear. Good coaching, like good parenting, means seeing the whole team and each individual. My children share similarities, yet each is their own person. The same is true for my players. Much of my coaching involves one-on-one pull-outs. Breaking down a skill, easing nerves, building confidence and helping a young athlete define her own goals.

Some of my favorite moments are when creativity unlocks a breakthrough. Two of my players were musical theater kids. One girl, bright and buoyant, sang Broadway tunes during drills. I used her natural projection as the team example for calling “Mine!” loudly enough to be heard on the court. Another struggled to keep her arms straight when passing, sending balls behind her. We talked about keeping her “stage”—her forearms flat and clear so the ball could “dance.” It clicked.

Highlight-reel moments—big blocks, dives, and aces—are thrilling. But what gives me chills is when the entire team

erupts in cheers for a girl who, after weeks of effort, gets her first serve over the net. Those moments matter. They become a reservoir of confidence kids can draw from their whole lives.

Coaching your own child can be its own mystifying sport. It’s hard to be objective, so assistant coaches and game stats help keep things fair. I’m clear with my children. I expect them to model sportsmanship and work hard, that they earn playing time just like everyone else.

And, unsurprisingly, kids don’t always listen to their parents, even when their parent is also their coach. More than once, a mom-coaching partner and I have whispered, “Can you tell my daughter to toss the ball higher for her serve? She won’t listen to me.” Miraculously, the same advice from another coach works instantly. Later, your child reports it as a revelation, “Coach Sayoko said to toss it higher and she was right!” Of course she was.

I remember one game with my youngest, Anna. I instructed her to serve underhand because we needed consistent points and her overhand wasn’t ready. She bounced the ball, set up, paused, and locked eyes with me. I knew that look. She tossed it high and attempted the overhand serve—straight into the net. She shrugged. I smiled. It wasn’t defiance; it was risk-taking with low-stakes consequences. Not a bad instinct.

Coaching your child also gives you a front-row seat to unforgettable moments. In the seventh-grade championship match - game point - the daughter of my co-coach Anita set the ball to my daughter Maya. Maya swung big and put down the winning kill. Anita and I didn’t cheer; we just turned to each other, tears in our eyes. Our girls had done it.

Coaching is one of the best things I’ve done. So good that even now that my daughters have moved on to high school sports, I’m still coaching the younger kids. It’s so rewarding and fun to watch young athletes find joy, rise above challenges and help them experience success on their own terms.

These days, that also means driving Maya to compete in the state high school volleyball tournament and watching Anna and Marcie’s daughter give tips to our new sixth-grade team. The cycle continues. Older girls lifting the younger ones, moms trading clipboards, and volleyballs still flying in every direction.

Working together ensures student success

I write this from a place of deep love, care, and commitment for our local students, families, and educators. I'm born and raised in Santa Fe, and my roots are deep and my desire to see our community thrive is strong. I've had the absolute pleasure of serving as a public-school educator for the past 25 years. I call my school a gem in the heart of our community because it is just that. On any given day, you will find parents eating lunch with their Firebirds and volunteers reading with kids. You'll find sixth graders helping kindergartners and first graders learning from third graders. This certainly did not happen overnight. I'm proud to share that my staff, families, and I have been working at this for seven years. We've taken the time to get to know each other, to form trusting relationships with each other and we are absolutely committed to ensuring that the needs of our students are met every single day. I tell our students that we love them and care about them every single day. We meet our students and families where they are at. of years, we have respectfully chipped away at the wall. We've loved them on their good days and embraced them on their not so good days. What began as unreturned hellos and good-mornings became "How are you, Mrs. Maestas" and "They have snack for their class today." From a family that barely made it to school most days to a family that attends many of our events, the transformation has been an amazing one. It's been one that has taken time, but most of all it has taken open arms and open hearts. I've been at this for a long time, and I know that while some families take a little more time to be engaged than others, all parents want the best for their kids.

Parents are juggling many hats, as are our educators. Together, we have the potential to support our most precious children as they become strong, productive adults. It is said that it takes a village and this is truer today than ever. So, where do we start? Well, as educators we need to ensure that we are not only saying that families are welcome in our schools, but that we are actively and intentionally providing opportunities for families to be engaged. Whether it is a designated time to enjoy lunch together or a music performance, families must be welcome and invited at the school site. We must move beyond simply attending parent teacher conferences and into planning events together and having hard conversations about proficiency levels and daily attendance. In our home, our own kids are now adults, and we are entering into a season of grandkids. Being a parent of young kids can feel very far away, but it's not hard for me to remember the nights of juggling homework, dinner, baths, and bedtimes. It takes prioritizing and turning an eye on the pile of laundry. It takes missing a show in your favorite series to sit and read a bedtime story. And it takes putting away all devices to enjoy a conversation over dinner. Our educators are ready to invite kids into our classrooms and we're ready to teach them to become stronger readers, writers, mathematicians, and scientists. Above all, we are ready to help them become productive and kind citizens, prepared to take on the world. The kids in our classrooms today are tomorrow's electricians, teachers, nurses, and lawyers. Without hesitation, I am sure that strong family and school partnerships have the potential to not only support our students today, but also for the many years to come.



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
