Back in the summer of 1994, when I revamped my little newsletter *The Tot's Hot News* for toddlers and preschoolers into the first issue of *Tumbleweeds*, my little boy was about to enter first grade. Today, he's 30. Longtime readers have watched him grow up in these pages. You've

read about my husband's fishing trips, and the passing of our beloved dog Emily, and the months we spent in a hotel after a burst washing machine hose flooded our house. You followed the last years of my parents' lives and the ongoing misadventures of our impish cat Misty. You accompanied us through the growth and changes in Santa Fe for two and a half decades—or whatever period you've been raising or teaching children in this town.

It's time to make room for a new set of stories.

Tumbleweeds is still going strong. Despite all you've heard about the decline of ad revenue for daily and weekly publications, *Tumbleweeds* ad sales for most issues of the last year were our strongest ever. We have several new advertisers in this issue, and some who have been with us since our yery first issue.

We're still winning awards. We tied for second place for the highest number of award points in the New Mexico Press Women 2019 Communications Contest—including first place for editing and design in the magazine/magpaper category. We won first place for Will McDonald's personal essay "He's Leaving Home," about his son's departure for college, and Jocelyn Salaz's food article "The Secret Ingredient" about making biscochitos with her family; second place for my "Notes from Claudette" columns and Josh Rappaport's "Practical Math Adds Up to Enjoyable Learning;" and third place for Katie Weeks' "Observe, Explore, Design & More," and our office assistant Diane Smogor's "Inspiring Science." McDonald's essay went on to the National Federation of Press Women Communication Contest for first-place winners from all state chapters and took second place. Two years ago the Santa Fe Chamber of Commerce honored us as the 2017 Family Friendly Business of the Year.

So we're still hot.

But it's time for *Tumbleweeds* to be someone else's baby. Our new owner might be a young mom or dad, or perhaps an involved grandparent. It might be a pair of co-owners who divide responsibilities, or perhaps an organization that absorbs Tumbleweeds into its existing operation. He, she or they will have the opportunity to take an established publication into new content areas, new geographic regions, new media outlets and new stories.

This is an opportunity for a fresh set of eyes to observe and respond to changes in the family community. Back in our early days, one of our frequent contributors (the late early-childhood educator Phyllis Nye) used to submit articles handwritten on legal pads. In this issue, we have an article by Ashley O'Malley, president of the Santa Fe Mommy Meetup Group—a way for parents to connect that we hadn't even imagined back then. Her article, "Fresh-Air Fun," reads like a good friend's recommendations of the city's best parks, playgrounds and hiking trails for children, all field-tested by Mommy Meetup and Hike it Baby members. What changes in our ways of connecting might lie ahead?

You'll find O'Malley's article translated into Spanish by Flor de María Oliva, "Diversión al aire libre," reflecting another change Santa Fe has experienced in the past 24 years—a burgeoning community of Spanish-speaking parents.

Tumbleweeds has seen a proliferation of arts programs in its lifetime—including the excellent Dragonfly Art Studio—whose director, Oceanna Holton, offers an indigo art project to do in your home or summer program; see "Blue Beauty." You'll see many exquisite examples of indigo (which predates Tumbleweeds by only a few millennia) at the 16th Annual International Folk Art Market, July 13 and 14 on Museum Hill. Look for details in the sidebar to Holton's article, and in Tumbleweeds' summer calendar starting on page 28.

We are fortunate that so many nonprofits have been serving the community for decades, including the New Mexico Wildlife Center, founded in 1986. Director Melissa Moore takes us behind the scenes into the center's hospital, where abandoned or injured animals are rescued and returned to the wild or kept at the center as "animal ambassadors."

Carmen Harris takes readers onto trails around and outside of town to look for signs of animal presence in places where they normally reside in her lovely article "The Wonders of the Wild." Which is nothing ... Youth Services Librarian Walter Cook takes us across the universe, in his "To the Stars and Beyond!"

This year's state legislative session brought more action for children and families than we've seen in recent years—many successes, some failures—highlighted by James Jimenez, the executive director of New Mexico Voices for Children, a nonpartisan children's advocacy organization we have admired for years.

Changes in children's technological awareness in recent years are unfortunately supplanting their awareness of their natural environment. Retired teacher Lynn Grimes shares an inspiring art and writing project she led in Jill Miyagawa's second-grade class at Turquoise Trail Charter School, based on the gorgeous picture book The Lost Words; see "There's a Word for That!"

And while so many things change, others stay the same. Grandparents are still nuts about their grandchildren. Gloria Valdez writes about visiting Albuquerque's Tingley Beach with her grandkids, an easy drive from Santa Fe and perfect for a summer day trip, in "Off to the Beach!"

Whether you've been picking up *Tumbleweeds* for 24 years or this is your first issue, you're part of a family of people around town and around the world (and some in the next world) who have read, written for and advertised in Tumbleweeds. I called you all together for this family meeting because I wanted you to hear of these changes straight from me—and because I suspect the new owner may be someone who already reads and loves this publication. Where will the new owner take this publication? I look forward to seeing. In the meantime, dig in to this issue, and have a great summer!








Fresh-Air Fun

From parks to trails, these open spaces are loved by kids and parents alike

I joined the Santa Fe Mommy

Meetup Group and the Santa Fe branch of Hike it Baby when my son was just 4 months old. In the year and a half since, I've learned so much about the many wonderful outdoor activities and destinations for kids in Santa Fe.

Today, I'm president of the Santa Fe Mommy Meetup Group, a group for all moms, dads and caregivers who delight in having fun with their children, primarily (but not limited to) newborns to 5-year-olds. We strive to support one another's parenting adventures while encouraging friendships among parents, caregivers and children in Santa Fe and surrounding areas.

I'm also an active member of Hike it Baby, a nonprofit organization dedicated to building communities that support getting outside with children from birth to school-age. Our purpose is to support families as they get into nature whenever they feel ready. We are raising a generation to love the outdoors.

We host a variety of events from trail hikes to urban strolls, toddler crawls to park-and-plays. Hike it Baby is a friendly and inclusive community where all abilities and ages are welcome in a judgment-free zone to enjoy each other's company, be healthy and expose our children to the wonders of nature.

Here are some of Santa Fe Mommy Meetup and Hike it Baby's most popular places for exploring Santa Fe's great outdoors—all of them endorsed by kids as well as adults.

Parks, Playgrounds and a Pool

- Southwest Area Node (SWAN) Park: The newest park in Santa Fe, SWAN Park is conveniently located for families on the south side of Santa Fe: on Jaguar Road near New Mexico 599. The playground has two play structures with three slides and a fireman's pole. There are also two swings and a large sandbox complete with two digging tools. There's ample parking, a basketball court, baseball field, an area for playing soccer and a paved path for bike riding. The park also has a large grassy field and a covered area with picnic-ready tables. If you enjoy outdoor music, make sure you check out the Santa Fe Bandstand South-side concerts here throughout the summer.
- Ft. Marcy Park: This park is a wonderful option for

- hosting a birthday party or large gathering. Located at the intersection of Artist Road and Bishop's Lodge Road, it has a large grassy area perfect for many outdoor activities. The well-paved path that encircles the Ft. Marcy Recreation Complex and Playground is great for walking dogs or taking the strollers and bikes out for a spin (this is the location of the Mommy Meetup's annual Fourth of July Bike Parade!). The playground has a wide variety of offerings, including various intricate climbing structures for older kids and even a small play structure with boulder-like stairs for younger kids.
- Ragle Park: Located at Yucca Street and West Zia Road, this park works well for younger and older kids. The playground includes a multi-level play structure at the top of a hill with a thrilling slide that older children love. At the bottom of the hill is a smaller structure perfect for younger kids, with multiple slides and a small bridge that adds excitement to moving around the play area. This park includes two basketball courts, a paved path and a small pump track for young bike riders. All of these wonderful qualities make Ragle Park an excellent location for Baby Boot Camp Santa Fe (a stroller fitness class for parents and caregivers) and for entertaining restless kids after the adults work out!
- Bicentennial/Alto Park: This fantastic park on Alto Street along the Santa Fe River has a playground that's great for all ages, with multiple infant/toddler bucket swings that are rare for parks in Santa Fe. After playing at the playground, take a bike or stroller ride on the Santa Fe River Trail and stop off at John F. Ray Griego Park. Continue along the River Trail that can take you all the way to Frenchy's Field Park on Agua Fria Street. Bicentennial/Alto Park is also a great option for a picnic, with many tables, a large grassy area, and big trees providing much-needed shade on those bright Santa Fe days.

One of the key features of this park is the Bicentennial Swimming Pool, the city's only outdoor pool. This is a fun summer option for families with varying ages of kids. The fence-enclosed toddler pool has fountains, a slide, and a grassy area for taking a break. The main pool has two slides and a shallow area for younger kids. Warning:



Both the toddler pool and the main pool often reach their capacity, so get there early to ensure your spot! There are multiple sessions throughout the day, however, and these specific time slots allow many people to experience the pool with a manageable amount of time to swim and play.

Torreon Park: This a sweet little playground just off West Alameda between Huddlestone and Sam Streets near Bicentennial/Alto Park, with two different play structures, as well as picnic tables, basketball courts, a field and a trail. It is tucked away a bit from the main road and has some well-shaded areas. Look for the stone sculpture with the mural depicting the history of the Torreon neighborhood.


Hiking Trails

- Arroyo Hondo Open Space: This trail is a terrific option for younger kids just learning to hike. Located just off Arroyo Hondo Road about seven miles south of downtown Santa Fe, the trail starts at a small parking lot equipped with a portable restroom. There's only one picnic table, but there are numerous short rock ledges that kids love to sit on and enjoy a snack. This trail is well marked with maps along the way so you can keep an eye on the distance left to cover. This is also one of the most popular hikes attended by Hike it Baby members.
- Aspen Vista: This is an easy uphill option with many exciting features along the way. There are multiple wooden stick forts for kids to explore, and these areas have logs that work great as snack stops. This trail is considered to be all-terrain stroller friendly and works well for early walker/ hikers. You'll find picnic tables and bathrooms at the trailhead, at the Aspen Vista Overlook on Hyde Park Road, about 14 miles from the Santa Fe Plaza.
- Borrego/Bear Wallow: This trail, also located off Hyde Park Road, offers a wonderful adult-paced hike that works well for kids in carriers or hiking backpacks. To keep this hike short and simple, stay to the right at the fork. You'll come to a creek that's a hit with kids and works well as a snack stop. Turn around and come back the way you came. You can continue on as the trail makes a loop, but it also intersects with other trails, which can be a bit confusing. This trail is popular option

for families with dogs, so you can expect to meet new furry friends out on an adventure.

- Santa Fe Canyon Preserve: This trail, off Upper Canyon Road, provides many opportunities for learning, with numerous informational displays. It is well marked, with options to walk down by the water or away from it for a drier route. This trail also leads to the Randall Davey Audubon Center & Sanctuary, a must-see for its beautiful grounds, gardens and hiking trails.
- Leonora Curtin Wetland Preserve: This nature preserve of the Santa Fe Botanical Garden, adjacent to El Rancho de las Golodrinas in the village of La Cienega, has a beautiful pond with ducks and frogs. This is also another all-terrain, stroller-friendly option and provides a sturdy walking path for new walkers/hikers. The preserve is only open from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on weekends, May through October.

Parques y senderos, espacios abiertos que niños y padres aman

Me uní al grupo Santa Fe

Mommy Meetup y al Hike it Baby cuando mi hijo tenía tan sólo cuatro meses de edad. En el año y medio que ha pasado desde entonces, he aprendido tanto sobre las numerosas actividades y destinos al aire libre que existen para los niños en Santa Fe.

En la actualidad, soy presidenta del grupo Santa Fe Mommy Meetup, que es para toda mamá, papá v persona que cuida niños v se deleita en divertirse con ellos, especialmente (pero sin limitarse a) los recién nacidos hasta los de cinco años de edad. Nos esforzamos por apoyarnos en nuestras aventuras de crianza, mientras cultivamos amistades entre los padres de familia, los niños y quienes cuidan de ellos en Santa Fe y áreas aledañas.


También participo activamente en el grupo Hike it Baby, una organización no lucrativa que se dedica a "construir comunidades que apoyan las actividades al aire libre con los niños desde que son recién nacidos hasta que llegan a la edad escolar. Nuestro propósito es apoyar a las familias en su contacto con la naturaleza cuando se sientan listas para hacerlo. Estamos criando una generación que ama la naturaleza y las actividades al aire libre.

Llevamos a cabo una variedad de eventos que van desde caminatas en los senderos del área hasta paseos urbanos y paseos con los niños a parques y días de juego. Hike it Baby es una comunidad amigable e inclusiva donde todos son bienvenidos a un área donde ni juzgamos, ni importan la edad o habilidades y estamos para disfrutar la mutua compañía, fomentar la buena salud y exponer a nuestros hijos a las maravillas de la naturaleza.

Los siguientes son algunos de los lugares populares donde los dos grupos, Santa Fe Mommy Meetup y Hike it Baby, exploramos los espacios abiertos al aire libre de Santa Fe – lugares que disfrutan tanto niños como adultos.



• El parque SWAN: El parque más nuevo en Santa Fe, el parque SWAN (Southwest Area Node, en inglés), está convenientemente situado para las familias que viven en el lado sur de la ciudad en Jaguar Road cerca de la carretera 599. Tiene dos estructuras de juego con tres toboganes y un poste para deslizarse. También hay dos columpios y un cajón grande de arena con herramientas para cavar. El estacionamiento es amplio y hay asimismo una cancha de baloncesto, un campo de béisbol, un área para jugar balompié y un sendero pavimentado para montar bicicleta. El parque también cuenta con un campo con césped y un área cubierta con mesas para picnic. Si le gusta la



música, asegúrese de asistir a los conciertos del programa Santa Fe Bandstand en este vecindario durante el verano.

- El parque de Ft. Marcy: Éste es una muy buena opción para celebrar fiestas de cumpleaños o reuniones grandes. El parque queda en la esquina de Artist Road y Bishop's Lodge Road y tiene un área grande de césped para actividades al aire libre. El sendero pavimentado que circunda el complejo de recreación Ft. Marcy y el área de juegos infantiles es perfecto para caminar con las mascotas o dar un paseo con los niños en sus cochecitos o en bicicleta. (Aquí es donde se lleva a cabo el desfile de bicicletas anual del 4 de julio del grupo Mommy Meetup). Entre la variedad de lo que ofrece el parque de juegos para niños se incluyen también estructuras para que los mayorcitos se suban y hasta una pequeña estructura de juego con escaleras de piedras para que se suban los pequeños.
- El parque Ragle: Este parque está situado en la esquina de Yucca Street y W. Zia Road y funciona bien para bebés y niños más grandecitos. En el área de juegos infantiles hay una estructura
- de diferentes niveles en la cima de una colina con un tobogán que encanta a los niños mayorcitos. Al pie de la colina hay una estructura más pequeña para niños más chiquitos, con resbaladeros y un puentecito que hace los juegos en el área más emocionantes. En este parque hay dos canchas de baloncesto, un sendero pavimentado y una pequeña pista diseñada especialmente para que los pequeños ciclistas puedan generar impulso sin tener que pedalear tanto. Todo esto hace del parque Ragle un excelente lugar para el Baby Boot Camp Santa Fe (una clase de ejercicios con cochecitos para padres de familia y cuidadores de niños) y para entretener a niños inquietos después que de que los adultos terminan sus ejercicios.
- El parque Bicentenario/Alto: Este fantástico parque en Alto Street cerca del río Santa Fe tiene un área de juegos que es genial para todas las edades, con muchos columpios con sillas resistentes a la presión que son raros para los parques en Santa Fe. Después de jugar en el área de recreo, puede dar un paseo en bicicleta o con el cochecito en el sendero del río Santa Fe y visitar el parque John F. Ray Griego. Continúe por ese sendero hasta llegar al parque Frenchy's Field en Agua Fria Street. El parque Bicentenario/Alto también es una buena opción para un picnic pues tiene muchas mesas, un área amplia con césped y árboles grandes que ofrecen sombra en esos días calurosos de Santa Fe.

Una característica especial del parque es su piscina, la única al aire libre en la ciudad. Ésta es una opción divertida para las familias con chicos de diferentes edades. La piscina para los chiquitos está cercada y tiene fuentes, un tobogán y un área con césped para descansar. La piscina principal tiene dos toboganes y un área no muy profunda para que los niños puedan jugar. Lo único es que con frecuencia las dos piscinas se llenan a capacidad, así es que hay que llegar temprano para encontrar lugar. Sin embargo, hay múltiples sesiones durante el día y esto permite que el público tenga suficiente tiempo para nadar y jugar en la piscina.

• El parque Torreon: Éste es un parquecito infantil muy cerca del Bicentenario/Alto y de West Alameda, entre Huddlestone y Sam Streets. Tiene dos estructuras de juego diferentes, así como mesas para picnic, canchas de baloncesto, un campo y un sendero y áreas de sombra. Busque la escultura de piedra con el mural que muestra la historia del vecindario Torreón.

SENDEROS PARA CAMINAR

- Espacio abierto de Arroyo Hondo: Este sendero es perfecto para los niños chiquitos que están aprendiendo a hacer senderismo. Situado al pie del camino Arroyo Hondo, unas siete millas al sur del centro de Santa Fe, el sendero empieza en un pequeño estacionamiento equipado con un baño portátil. Tiene sólo una mesa para picnic, pero hay muchas rocas pequeñas donde a los niños les gusta sentarse para disfrutar de su merienda. Este sendero está bien marcado con mapas a lo largo del camino para que el senderista pueda estar al tanto de la distancia que le queda por cubrir. Éste también es uno de los senderos más populares entre los miembros del grupo Hike it Baby.
- Aspen Vista: Ésta es una opción ascendente fácil con muchas características atractivas a lo largo del camino. Hay muchos fuertes de madera para que los niños exploren y estas áreas tienen muchos

- troncos donde uno puede sentarse a tomar un bocadillo. Se considera que este sendero es todo terreno para los cochecillos y funciona también para los novatos en caminar o hacer senderismo. En la entrada del sendero encontrará mesas para picnic y baños, en el mirador de Aspen Vista en el camino Hyde Park, como a 14 millas de la plaza de Santa Fe.
- Borrego/Bear Wallow: Situado también cerca del camino de Hyde Park, este sendero ofrece una maravillosa caminata a ritmo de adultos que funciona bien para los niños en sus cochecitos o mochilas de senderismo. Para una caminata corta y simple, manténgase a la derecha de la bifurcación. Llegará a un riachuelo que es todo un éxito con los chiquillos y también un buen lugar para un bocadillo. Puede regresar por el mismo camino o seguir también ya que el sendero hace un círculo, pero también se cruza con otros senderos que pueden ser un poco confusos. Este sendero es popular para quienes tienen perros, así

- es que puede esperar encontrar nuevos amigos peludos también disfrutando de la aventura.
- La reserva de Santa Fe Canyon: Este sendero, cerca del camino Upper Canyon, ofrece muchas oportunidades para aprender, con exhibiciones informativas. Está bien marcado, con opciones para llegar al río o seguir una ruta más seca. También conduce al centro y santuario Randall Davey Audubon, un sitio que vale la pena ver por la belleza de su terreno, jardines y senderos.
- La reserva humedal Leonora Curtin: Esta reserva de la naturaleza del Jardín Botánico de Santa Fe, situada a la par del Rancho de las Golodrinas en La Ciénega, tiene un hermoso estanque con patos y ranas. Es también una buena opción todo terreno para cochecillos y ofrece un sendero robusto para caminantes y senderistas. Sólo abre de 9 a.m. a 3 p.m. los fines de semanas, de mayo a octubre.

Para unirse al grupo Santa Fe Mommy, por favor visite el sitio meetup.com y busque nuestro grupo. Tenemos muchas fechas para jugar, eventos de caridad, reuniones educativas y de familia donde usted podrá conocer a

There's a Word for That!

All-ages picture book revisits nature terms removed from children's dictionary

"Once upon a time, words began to vanish from the language of children."


This is the ominous beginning of Robert

Macfarlane and Jackie Morris' beautiful picture book *The Lost Words*, published in Great Britain in 2017 and North America in 2018. The "lost words" refer to nature words that were removed from the Oxford Junior Dictionary in 2007, in order to make room for words the publishers said were more commonly used by children today. Words such as acorn, otter and willow were removed and replaced with words that included attachment, blog, cut-and-paste and celebrity.

News of this word substitution caused an outcry among those concerned about the decline in outdoor play and children's relationships with nature. A group of well-known authors, including Macfarlane and Margaret Atwood, wrote a letter pleading with the publishers to put the nature words back in, stating, "the link between nature and culture is in danger of becoming unravelled, to the detriment of society, culture and the natural environment"—not to mention to the detriment of the well-being of children who've become increasingly disconnected from the natural world.

Author Macfarlane and illustrator Morris created a book with a mission to stop the unravelling and to conjure the nature words back into use. The Lost Words is a book that can help people of all ages engage in language and art about nature, and help society establish stronger connections to the natural environment.

The 20 "lost words" of the title are brought back to life with acrostic "spells" and rich watercolors backed in gold. Many of the nature subjects are well-




known to adults—such as heron, willow and ivy—but might not be known to children. Other words, such as conker and adder, are less common in North America, so there are new words to learn here as well.

The large format of the book creates a mini-natural environment that wraps around and invites you to dive into each picture and poem. Pages are filled with paintings of branches, ferns, forests, critters, falling leaves, mixed-up letters and distinct negative shapes of missing items—providing a magical space for exploration and imagination. It's a book to slow down and spend time with, in order to discover meaning in both the words and pictures. And it is also a book to be read out loud, so that the spells, "by the old, strong, magic of being spoken aloud," will summon the lost words back into use.

The Lost Words can be used as a tool to bring wonderment back into the world, as the words themselves often express meaning and poetry that's been lost. The spell for dandelion tells of the ancient root, dent-de-lion (diente de leon in Span-

ish), which means lion's tooth, so named for the sharp, jagged edge of the leaf. Macfarlane also proposes new, more contemporary names for the dandelion:

> I would make you some, such as Bane of Lawn Perfectionists Or Fallen Star of the Football Pitch Or Scatterseed, but Never would I call you only, merely, simply "weed".

And in his spell for the kingfisher, he tells of poetic, magical names the bird has been called:

> Halcyon is its other name—also ripple calmer, water—nester Evening angler, weather—teller, rainbringer and Rainbow bird—that sets the stream alight with burn and glitter!

Here in the Land of Enchantment, The Lost Words can be an inspiration to deepen connections to the local environment and make sure the words that name our natural surroundings do not disappear from use. After taking time to read and explore the book, children can create their own spells and images for words that are in the book or words more specific to New Mexico, such as yucca, prickly pear and arroyo.

At Santa Fe's Turquoise Trail Charter School, Jill Miyagawa's second-grade class wrote acrostic poems and made colorful drawings this spring about nature words they chose from their own experiences. Some were inspired by observations right around the school. Outside the window of the classroom there are ravens—not crows! —who hang around the Dumpsters and have made a large nest on top of the school's water towers. There are *cottonwood* trees on the periphery of the parking lot and meadowlarks and prairie dogs in the fields. And beyond the school's fence, there is a herd of *pronghorn antelope* that can often be seen from the highway on the way to school.

At first glance, children might think there's not much out there in our high desert environment, but once they start paying attention, excitement and awareness will grow. Time spent with *The Lost Words* has also inspired the children to tell stories about their encounters with nature, about such things as snakes, lizards and birds building nests in places around their homes. It takes a little while for the realization to dawn that they do have a relationship with the outdoors.

The book then becomes a jumping-off point for writing, research, science and art projects, as well as learning new words. Most importantly, it sends them outside to make new discoveries and more connections to the surrounding natural world.

The Lost Words has become a phenomenon among educators, artists and lovers of nature. Entire school districts in the United Kingdom have purchased the book, and public readings have included music specifically composed to accompany poems and paintings in the book. The John Muir Trust, a UK organization whose mission is "to work with others to inspire people to get close to wild nature," has extensive lesson plans, activities, posters, poetry and art related to the book, as well as a wonderful nature and literacy resource guide, at www. johnmuirtrust.org/initiatives/the-lost-words. Their Explorer's Guide to The Lost *Words* offers research and creative ideas for each word, as well as connections for further reading and viewing. These resources are not just for teachers. They are useful for anyone who wants to delve in and find more ideas to extend the meaning and influence of the book.

The Lost Words is a book that can be shared in families, schools, camps or nature centers, outdoors or indoors. It is a book that inspires us to learn the names of the natural things around us, see the world anew and get closer to wild nature. Every child, every person, can look at something like a dandelion with fresh eyes.

It's not hard to go find a dandelion and pick it. Look closely and notice the details. Describe it. Wonder about it. Speak The Lost Words' spell aloud. Say the name in Spanish. Google it! Did you know it came from Europe? Did you know you can eat the leaves? Smell it, taste it, touch it. Draw it—composite flower, leaves like a lion's tooth, seed head of tiny parachutes. What does it remind you of?

Make up a new name. Write a new spell, a poem, a song. Tell a story, create an artwork. Speak with the power of your unique perspective and conjure the lost words back! It might be fun, it might make the world more interesting, and it might help you and others become more connected to and enchanted by the natural world outside your door.

Explore a universe of stories at the Santa Fe Public Library • By Walter Cook

You don't need a flying saucer to explore the

universe. You'll find fantasmagorical modes of transportation conveniently placed at your Santa Fe Public Library. Books—whether on audio CD, downloadable audio, downloadable print or ordinary paper—are your gateway to the stars.

This year, Santa Fe Public Library is celebrating "A Universe of Stories" during its Summer Reading Program for youth. The goal of this program is to help families make books part of their summer experience and perhaps build or maintain reading skill levels for the following school year.

Beginning in June, the three branches of Santa Fe Public Library will have musical programs for babies (in Spanish and English), as well as story times. For older children, there will be stage performances, telescopes, puppets shows, strange and unusual animal visits, and craft activities to delight youthful wouldbe astronomers. And, of course, there are library books that complement our "Universe of Stories" theme.

A well-seasoned young reader can independently dive into a subject—such as space, astronomy or even science fiction—enjoy it, evaluate it and discuss it. The Santa Fe Public Library has much for the independent and curious reader to explore. But before children reach that stage of reading development, how can parents help their kids make use of and enjoy books?

The first step is to make books come alive! Read to your children, play with stories, and enliven each character with the sound of your voice. A little tiny mouse has a little squeaky voice and a big old draft horse has a big deep voice you must become a little mouse and an old draft horse. What would a little green Martian sound like? Have fun with this!

One of the programs the library will offer this summer will involve solar telescopes. Young children are aware of the sun and, perhaps to a lesser extent, the moon and stars. They have a clear, eye-level understanding of the walls of their home or the legs of their adults, but how much do they understand about the worlds beyond their home?

How about the moon? The perennial favorite, Goodnight Moon by Margaret Wise Brown starts with a bedroom in primary colors and moves beyond the room, out the window, to the sky, moon, stars and back again. The author has taken that which is familiar and added a moon and stars. This book, which especially appeals to young children, is also available as a bilingual board book,

Goodnight Moon/Buenos Noches, Luna, with the same charming illustrations by Clement Hurd.

Kitten's First Full Moon, written and illustrated by Kevin Henkes, is an excellent choice for parents looking to introduce the moon to younger children. Our kitten notices the moon following her as she walks; she sees the moon in the branches of the trees and sees the moon reflected in a pond. The child experiencing this book for the first time will not truly understand what the kitten is experiencing without a little guidance from their adult. On a clear night, under a full moon, walk beneath the trees and watch the moon follow you. Look for the reflection of the moon in a puddle of water. What happens when you try to touch the moon's reflection in the water? Make the story come alive! A Spanish version of the book, *La Primera Luna Llena de Gatita*, is also available at the library.

Nonfiction books (based upon facts) and science fiction have a common element: description. In order to move into the world of science fiction or scientific information, the author must describe and help the reader understand that which is beyond immediate reality. The author's description, and your conversation with your child, will help him or her move from the walls of the home to the bigger world of Earth and the universe beyond. Your Alien and Your Alien Returns by Tammi Sauer, illustrated by Goro Fujita, are inviting stories for younger children that fit perfectly with this idea. In Your Alien, an alien from outer space visits our protagonist and becomes a friend. We become aware of a world outside our own, and, in Your Alien Returns, our hero leaves a familiar home to visit another planet. Illustrations, text and your discussion will enliven this new and strange place.

As reading skills advance, *The Magic School Bus* series is enduring nonfiction and a popular choice, particularly for children in the 6 to 8 age range. In one book in the series, *The Magic School Bus Takes a Moonwalk*, we again move from our familiar world to the unfamiliar surface of the moon. Perhaps the most magical aspect of this series is the format. Each book can be read three times for three stories. First, there is the dialogue among the characters, next the narrative and finally the facts. That writing style elicits delight for many readers. You can help your child develop delight in literature, a gift that will last a lifetime.

As soon as you walk through the wardrobe in *The Lion, the Witch and the* Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis, you know you have entered a new world. The characters move from a typical room in summer to a winter forest. Vivid description defines the look and feel of the forest. The author continues to define this new world of Narnia throughout the seven-volume Chronicles of Narnia series for older readers.

If books located on the shelves of the library had an address, it would be the Dewey Decimal System. Understanding details of this system is not really that important. Knowing that books about the moon, sun, solar system, universe, black holes, comets, stars, etc., are all in one area of the library shelves *is* important. Ask a librarian, "Where are the books about astronomy?" They will guide you.

There, you will find books and activities to help your child make sense of the universe. How hot is the sun? How dense is Venus? What are the rings of Saturn made up of? There is so much to explore. As a parent, you will learn more about the universe than you ever thought you wanted to know. The only problem, perhaps, is if your child asks, "What comes after the universe?" That might be a question more suited to a

doctoral thesis!

The library also has a number of astronomy activity books. Indeed, there are activity books to help kids explore all scientific disciplines. Astronomy Lab for Kids: 52 Family-Friendly Activities by Michelle Nichols stands out. The author will help you and your child make an eclipse. She'll also help wrap your mind around the size of our solar system. If we were to count steps from the planets to planet Mercury would be 62 steps to the Sun, Venus would be 54 steps from Mercury, and Earth would be 45

steps from Venus. Given those ratios, how far do you think Pluto would be? Would we have to walk all the way to Albuquerque? These are just two of her incredibly fun activities, which will help you and your children learn a lot as well.



Cross the galaxies this summer with your public library card.

Parents sometimes ask for stories about adventures aboard rocket ships. Eleanor Cameron's *The* Wonderful Flight to the Mushroom Planet is a friendly chapter book of about 200 pages especially suitable for kids ages 8 to 12. In the story, a group of friends befriend a neighbor who happens to be from another planet. Together, they board a rocket ship and fly to a new planet. What could be more fun? Again, our protagonists live in a normal world; they step in to a rocket and find themselves in an entirely new world with mushrooms growing everywhere.

More typical travel to other planets in books for youth involves dimensional shifts. A Wrinkle in Time by Madeleine L'Engle, a Newbery-award winner from 1962, is one book that should be on every reading list. Our protagonists live a typical suburban

> life but set upon a multidimensional journey to save one girl's father. With the help of entertaining and bizarre characters, our heroes are transported across space and time. We know beyond a doubt that we are in a new universe when one character transforms into a flying carpet-like leaf. Can our heroes save the father? Read the book to find out, and read the entire Wrinkle in Time series!

On a more humorous level, the *Moon Base Alpha* series by Stuart Gibbs is proving to be popular with youth. This "save-the-universespace-opera" is a fun-filled riotous journey that begins on a moon base, without pesky parents to interrupt the hero's journey!

An incredible array of subjects is available at your library. Summer is the time when your child is most freely able to choose and explore the subjects that ignite their own unique

imaginations. Santa Fe Public Library is there to help guide them. We make it fun with performances, activities and reading incentives. And it's all free! Visit the library's calendar of events at santafelibrary.org/children or the *Tumbleweeds* summer calendar in this issue and online, for a full listing of activities. There truly is "A Universe of Stories" at your Santa Fe Public Library for explorers of all ages.

The WONDER of the WILD

From fawns to frogs, nature's beauty is just a drive or hike away

Tracking the world of animals outside our homes

and daily human world can bring a lot of joy when we have clues as to what we might see and where these animals commonly reside. We have the good fortune here in Santa Fe to have easily accessible wild lands that are home to a wider variety of animals than many of us are aware of.

Here are just a few of the creatures you might be excited to encounter on an excursion to one of our local wild lands.

To make the most of visiting with other creatures, try early mornings and later afternoons or evenings as your hiking times. These are the most active moments for animals and therefore the optimal times for your wonder-filled adventures.

Just as we like to hide in the shade on summer days, fawns—who are born in the summer months—nestle up alone, or with their siblings, under trees with low-lying foliage, where they are camouflaged by their dappled spots and light brown coloration. As you hike, keep your eyes out for deer beds—oval-shaped depressions of compressed grass beneath trees, in bushy areas or in shady glades—where you can lie down and see where fawns and deer have slept. White-tailed deer and mule deer are the most common species in New Mexico. White-tails are more common at lower elevations during the summer. As the name suggests, white-tailed deer have white coloration under their tails, while mule deer are recognizable by black-tipped tails. An early morning walk or late afternoon stroll at the easily accessible Nature Conservancy's Santa Fe Canyon Preserve (beaver ponds) on Upper Canyon Road will often reveal deer activity.

The Nature Conservancy has been actively protecting the northern leopard frog for some years, and they are now well established in the ponds.

These frogs are quite sizable—between 2 and 4 ½ inches — and easy to see when you are quiet and still along the edge of the smaller ponds. The frogs speak loudly in a low-pitched, chainsaw-like call, and are amazing to watch as they fill their cheek pouches with air. The northern leopard frog commonly lives two to five years, but can live up to nine years in the wild. They usually breed between April and early June. Each female (larger than the males) lays an egg mass of up to 6,000 eggs (about half a centimeter in size each). These are strung onto some surface or submerged plant matter in the water and take five to seven days to hatch. Looking for frogs and tadpoles can make for a very fun expedition!

Note that all amphibians breathe through their skin and are hypersensitive to the salts, oils and other products on our skin. Handling frogs and salamanders (who also reside near the ponds) can be extremely harmful for them, and their populations are already in steep decline. Finding alternative ways to connect with these fascinating creatures, such as quiet observation and journaling or animal charades, is more ecologically responsible than being tempted to catch and handle them. Oh! Don't forget to look out for great blue heron fishing in the waters or flying overhead. A frog probably makes a delicious meal!

If you'd like to see even bigger frogs, go and visit the bullfrogs (named for their bull-like roar) at the Leonora Curtain Wetland Preserve in La Cienega, just south of Santa Fe. These educational and well-loved wetlands are open on weekends from the first weekend of May through the last weekend of October. Take a walk down one of the main trails, past the huge Rio Grande cottonwoods



and a large number of native plants, to the pond and sit for a while on the dock. There are wonderful picnic areas in strategic places, so bring along something to sip or munch!

As with the northern leopard frog, the female bullfrogs are larger than the males, reaching up to 6 inches in length and regularly weighing over one pound. The males are extremely territorial, which can be seen through visual displays of self-inflation. These frogs are opportunistic ambush predators who prey on any small animal they can overpower and fit down their throats. Bullfrogs use their long tongue to strike their prey and have an unusually strong jaw that grips larger food, such as small rodents, reptiles, amphibians, birds and bats. It is also common for many species of frogs to eat smaller frogs for dinner.

If butterflies, a running stream, and the prospect of getting to some waterfalls and wildflowers are what you're after, the Lower Rio en Medio Trail, outside Tesuque, provides a refreshing wander. Take a nature guidebook or fold-out picture identification guide of wildflowers and butterflies of New Mexico with you along the trail to identify various flowering plants and spot the species of butterflies you see. Children often love to carry these and stop for investigations. Look online for easily printable picture guides. Swallowtails, cabbage whites, the golden-colored sulphur family and mourning cloak butterflies are but a few who flit along that trail. Decked in wildflowers and with a waterfall at a fair but walkable distance for children over 6, this is truly a magical place. Be aware, there is poison ivy along the very beginning of the trail, and a bear mother with cubs was spotted along this trail last summer!

Remember, these are wild spaces. Take time to equip yourselves with knowledge and effective practices of what to do if you encounter a bear, mountain lion or rattlesnake! And be on the lookout for signs of other creatures that might be out and about, from bear scratches on trees to fox and coyote scat on trails. There are many resources available online or at valuable educational hubs such as the Santa Fe Public Library and the Randall Davey Audubon Center on Upper Canyon Road, which has guide books and fold-out guides. These guides can also be found at Collected Works Bookstore in town.

Enjoy your adventures!

earity Indigo, an International Folk Art Market favorite, has ancient, global history By Oceanna Holton

What is indigo? Indigo is a deep blue dye that

has been used for thousands of years by cultures all over the world. The oldest known indigo-dyed fabric, found in Peru, dates to 6,000 years old! Indigo is exotic—a time-consuming, labor-intensive dye used in diverse artistic techniques—and also familiar. If you've ever worn a pair of blue jeans, that rich blue color that sometimes bleeds off onto other clothes originally came from indigo—and in some cases still does.

Indigo is made from a plant in the pea family that grows in hot, humid, tropical regions. Traditionally, the process of creating indigo begins with harvesting the plant in the fall, soaking the leaves in water for a day or longer, adding an oxidizing agent such as lime or urea, then vigorously mixing the solution until bubbles form and start to break. Pure cotton fabric is then dipped into the solution multiple times, letting the fabric dry between each dipping and repeating to create a darker fabric. When the fabric is first removed from the indigo bath it is a neon yellow, but as it combines with oxygen in the air, it turns blue before your eyes. Even today, with DIY kits that include a prepared indigo powder, the process of creating a simple indigo-dyed textile takes at least several days.

Communities in South and Central America, Asia, the Middle East and India use a variety of indigo-dying techniques to create a beautiful range of products. Patterns are created using any of several "resist" processes, including tying the fabric with rubber bands or string; stitching with nylon thread; wrapping it around a pole; folding it in careful patterns and clamping it between pieces of wood; applying wax; or binding it with other objects that keep the dye from reaching the fabric.

What makes indigo so special? In a word, color. No other dye captures the vibrant hue of indigo—from pale to almost black, depending on the number of times the fabric has been dipped and dried. Some African tribes believe the richer and more powerful a person is, the darker the indigo he or she is to wear.

One of the great mysteries of indigo is how a green plant can produce such a rich blue color. How did people first discover that the leaves of a common pea plant could replicate the ocean and sky? How did this technique evolve all over the world and survive for millennia? These are some of the mysteries you'll consider as you begin to explore indigo.

As you visit the booths of International Folk Art Market this summer, look for indigo textiles. This year's market will include dozens of indigo artists, from Mexico, China, Thailand, Mali, Nigeria and more. Before you go, watch the documentary "Blue Alchemy: Stories of Indigo," produced by Mary Lance, available on DVD and streaming on Vimeo (wp.bluealchemyindigo.com/streaming/), to get a better sense of the process and its current applications.

Make your own indigo, at home or at camp, with an inexpensive kit available at local craft stores or online. Or, purchase real indigo fabric (not blue-dyed cotton!) at Santa Fe Quilting and complete this simple embroidery project using the Japanese technique of sashiko embroidery.

Sashiko Embrodery Sachet

Sashiko means "little stab" in Japanese. Sashiko embroidery is a traditional Japanese technique with white embroidery thread on indigo-dyed fabric, creating patterns with a simple "running stitch." Here are the materials and steps you'll need to create a lovely 4-by-4-inch sachet. Vary it as you like to create a small pillow, pencil case, makeup pouch, patch for applying to a favorite piece of clothing or a quilt, or other object of your choosing.

What you'll need:

Indigo fabric

White, washable marking pencil

Darning needle (a long sewing needle with a big eye)

White embroidery floss

Sashiko template or stencil (available at craft stores or online)

Embroidery hoop (optional, but helpful)

Lavender, cotton or poly-fill stuffing

What to do:

Cut the indigo fabric into a 5-by-5-inch square. (Or, cut a 10-by-5-inch rectangle and fold it in half. This way you'll have one less edge to stitch closed.)

Place the fabric on a flat surface and, holding the stencil on it firmly, mark the lines within the template with the marking pencil. These marks will show where your stitches will go. With my students I use the Seven Treasures, Cherry Blossom and Wave templates of Sew Simple, but there are many options out there.

Put the marked fabric inside the embroidery hoop. This is optional but very helpful for holding the fabric steady as you sew.

Thread the white embroidery floss through the darning needle and tie off the end. Starting on the

back side of the fabric (to hide the knot), bring the threaded needle in and out of the fabric on the white lines, coming up through the fabric on one end of the line and through the fabric at the other end. This is known as a "running stitch." Work in a flowing motion, traveling on a diagonal as far in one direction as possible, then back in the other direction, until you have stitched over all the marks you traced with your marking pencil.

Turn the piece inside out so the right sides are together, then stitch around all sides to close the sachet, leaving an opening of about 1 inch for the stuffing. Then turn the pouch right side out and stuff it with dried lavender, cotton balls, poly-fill or a combination. Tuck the raw edges of that 1-inch hole and use a

small "whip stitch" to sew the opening shut.

The last step on your indigo discovery journey is to visit the International Folk Art Market, look for indigo art, and appreciate all the work and talent that went into creating it!

This year, there will also be a focus on sustainability on Sunday. There will be a guided tour of 25 market artists creating textiles with recycled and replenishable materials. This tour will be led by Keith Recker, IFAM's creative director, known

worldwide for his knowledge of textiles and folk art. It's sure to be a great experience for kids and parents alike.

Nigerian indigo artist Gasali Adeyemo will lead a special workshop from noon to 2 p.m. in the outdoor classroom on the upper level of the market. Adeyemo creates beautiful fabric and clothing using a technique he learned in his native Nigeria. He specializes in indigo dyes because of their cultural importance to his people, and each textile has traditional Yoruba designs, with symbolic and biographical meanings. Adeyemo loves teaching young people about indigo, as he feels it encourages them to preserve and cherish the fantastically beautiful artistic techniques of the Yoruba tribe.

Visit the 16th annual International Folk Art Market from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. July 13 and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. July 14 on Santa Fe's Museum Hill. Look for more details and a list of all workshops and tours at www.FolkArtMarket.org.

Legislative Session Scores Wins for Families

Not quite a 'moonshot,' but a healthy launch • By James Jimenez

Every parent's highest priority is their children.

But when it comes to making decisions about the state budget or tax code, the welfare of our children has been pushed aside too often in favor of other, more political, interests.

But this year was different. The 2019 legislative session logged several big wins for children and their families.

One of the wins that might make the most difference for our youngest children is the creation of a new Cabinet-level department, the Early Childhood Education and Care Department (ECECD), which will take over several programs that are currently housed in three separate departments. These programs—home visiting; Families, Infants and Toddlers (FIT) early intervention services; child care assistance; and New Mexico pre-K—are designed to ensure that our young children are ready to learn once they enter our public schools.

Combining them into one department conveys that these programs—and the young New Mexicans they serve—are a high priority for the state. One department can also ensure that these programs are better coordinated, that gaps in services are more effectively addressed and that inefficiencies are eliminated.

It's particularly important that child care assistance be housed in the new department. Child care was designed to allow parents to have a safe environment for their children while they work, but increasingly we know that child care programs must also better prepare children for school. Science shows us that the first five years of life are critical for the brain development that will allow for more formal learning in later years. We hope that our new department will build this program into what it should be: adequate support for high-quality care centers where children discover and learn through play in a structured environment.

Students also benefitted from this legislative session. While a significant infusion of funding— about \$450 million—went to our K-12 school system, this just gets us back to pre-recession spending levels on a per-student, inflation-adjusted basis. After eight years of short-sighted budget cuts, however, it is a welcome start, and it will allow our teachers to get a longneeded 6 percent raise.

There were other changes to education funding as well, some of them made in

response to the Yazzie-Martinez lawsuit, in which the court found New Mexico was failing to provide sufficient education for all children. The effective K-3 Plus program, which provides extra school days for kindergarten through third grade in schools with large shares of children from low-income families, was increased to fifth grade. Also, a change in the school funding formula will mean that schools where the children are most in need of additional support will receive more money for those students. Unfortunately, of the four bills that would have addressed other aspects of the lawsuit—namely, better aligning curriculum with our cultural heritage—only one passed. This demonstrates that we have a ways to go before the state is honoring the court's decision.

Other notable legislation relating to K-12 schools: a bill requiring school districts to screen children for dyslexia and provide early intervention, and a bill that changes current bullying prevention policy to include the protection of

both sexual orientation and gender identity and improves reporting procedures.

Several bills were passed that will improve economic security for many New Mexico families. The state's minimum wage was raised, which will benefit about 100,500 (or about 20 percent) of the state's children by increasing their parents' income. The wage will rise from \$7.50 an hour to \$9 in 2020, eventually reaching \$12 in 2023. The increase will not affect cities and counties-including Santa Fe, Albuquerque and Bernalillo—that already require a higher minimum wage.

Working parents who earn low wages will also see an increase in a tax credit that incentivizes work and has been shown to improve outcomes for children. The Working Families Tax Credit is the state version of the federal Earned Income Tax Credit, which has long been considered the best anti-poverty program ever enacted by Congress. The increase will put another \$40 million into the hands of working families. Studies have shown these tax credits allow families to eat more fruits and vegetables, afford large expenses such as car repairs, and even increase their work skills by taking college classes or earning a credential. Nearly half of New Mexico children live in families that receive these tax credits.

A tax change that will help families with multiple children is a new state income tax deduction of \$4,000 for each child beyond the first. This is a fix to the federal corporate tax cut from 2017, which eliminated the

exemption for dependents and resulted in a higher state income tax bill for large families when they filed their 2018 returns.

On the health front, the state authorized dental therapists, which will increase access to oral health care, particularly in rural and tribal communities, which have a shortage of dentists. Dental therapists are licensed dental practitioners who work as part of dentist-led teams. They offer routine and preventive care, and complement the work of dentists, increasing the productivity and reach of the dental care team. With nearly 900,000 New Mexicans unable to access adequate dental care, and more than 38,000 (or 25 percent) of our first-through sixth-graders having untreated tooth decay, this legislation is a game-changer for New Mexico.

One big disappointment from the 2019 legislative session was the withdrawal of a bill to address the child care "cliff effect." The cliff effect is what happens when a parent receives a pay raise that makes them ineligible for child care assistance. This creates a situation in which a family is worse off financially despite earning more money, because the benefits they lose are worth more than the raise. Most programs intended to help families move out of poverty—such as SNAP (food stamps), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and Medicaid—have a cliff effect, but the cliff effect for New Mexico's child care assistance program is especially large and results in parents turning down raises so they can keep affordable child care. These anti-poverty programs should help families move out of poverty, but this one has the unintended consequence of keeping parents trapped in low-wage jobs.

While many good things happened in the 2019 legislative session, we still have a long way to go before we are convinced that children really are a priority in our state. Our new governor talked about accomplishing a "moonshot" for education, and while we made progress, we really only began the journey. Likewise, we still have a long way to go before our tax system can be called fair, and we are committed to eliminating the cliff effect and ensuring the new ECEC department helps our children thrive.

Day Trip

Off to the Beach!

Pack a picnic; use your sunscreen; leave the surfboard home

Did you know we have a beach in the middle

of New Mexico?

When my husband and I first moved here from San Diego to retire, I was so excited to hear about "the beach." I was anxious to feel the warm sand between my toes again!

I have to admit, I was a little disappointed when I arrived at Tingley Beach in Albuquerque. Actually, I was very disappointed! I didn't expect an ocean here in the high desert, but maybe water with some sand and a few waves?

Here's what we found instead: three large fishing ponds, pedal boats and miniature model boats, walking paths, picnic areas and a beautiful variety of ducks, geese and other waterfowl, right off Central Avenue.

After living in Albuquerque now for 15 years, Tingley Beach has become my family's oasis in the desert, our go-to place where memories have been made and are in the making. I can't count the number of times we have taken our granddaughter, Anneliese, there to feed the ducks and geese. Once when she was just learning to run, she took off chasing a duck and almost fell in the water.

The beach is part of the ABQ BioPark—along with the BioPark Zoo, Aquarium and Botanic Garden—but while the other sites of the park charge admission, entry to Tingley Beach is free every day of the year, from sunrise to sunset.

The three fishing ponds are stocked about every two weeks by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. Central Pond, the largest of the three, is stocked with rainbow trout in the winter and channel catfish in the summer. You can also rent pedal boats on Central Pond in the summer months, by the hour or half-hour, for ages 3 and up.

The Children's Pond is also stocked with trout and catfish and is exclusively for ages 12 and under. Adults can accompany kids on the Children's Pond, but they can't fish there.

The Bob Gerding Catch and Release Pond, on the quieter, southern end of the beach, is stocked with rainbow trout for fishing with flies or barbless hooks. And there's even a small Model Boat Pond, for miniature wind or remote-control boats.

Anneliese is 13 now, and we don't see her as often as we'd like because I understand grandparents can be boring when you're a teenager. Enter Anneliese's 5-year-old brother, Andrew. No empty nest for us two old coots! We've been taking Andrew to the beach to feed the ducks and geese since he was a baby in a stroller eating Cheerios. (That reminds me: Don't feed bread to the ducks and geese! It's not good for their stomachs. The many water birds at Tingley Beach are all wild animals. The BioPark does not maintain these birds, but they do try to protect the welfare of all animals that can be found at their facilities. According to staff, water birds need a diet based on grain and insects. Bread has limited nutritional value and can be harmful, especially to developing ducklings.)

The fishing ponds are adjacent to the paved Paseo del Bosque Trail and a large park with trees, play equipment and picnic tables. We usually take our grandson on Fridays, which Andrew calls Fun Fridays. We take a picnic lunch—and let me tell you, that picnic basket carries plenty of memories! Restrooms, water fountains and vending machines are available inside the historic Tingley train station, and there are even two charcoal grills for public use except when fire danger is high.

Although admission to Tingley Beach is free, anglers age 12 and up are required to have a fishing license. Annual fishing licenses for New Mexico residents are \$25 for adults, \$5 for ages 12 to 17, \$8 for seniors 65 to 69, and free for anyone over 70. Children 11 and under don't need a license to fish. Nonresident and short-term passes are also available. Purchase them online at wildlife.state.

nm.us/fishing/licenses-permits or from any sporting goods store. From the looks of all the people fishing during our visits and from what they told us, the fishing is great! A day at the beach is an easy drive and fun summer day trip for Santa Fe residents. No swimming, surfing or wading is allowed, so it's best to leave your floaties, surfboards and inner tubes home. Enjoy a nice summer day with the sounds of children playing and ducks quacking. Don't forget your hat, sunglasses and sunscreen. Before you know it,

Backstage at a Wildlife Hospital

At the New Mexico Wildlife Center, hundreds of creatures are healed every year

If you've ever been in a hospital, you know how

bewildering it can be. Lots of activity, people moving to and fro carrying odd-looking instruments and wearing gloves and masks. It probably felt even more unfamiliar if you were ill or injured and waiting to be treated, as the pain or illness made you anxious.

Now imagine how it must feel for a wild creature to arrive in such a place. How frightening it could be for a bird with a broken wing, or a tiny rabbit swept from the warmth of its nest burrow to be scooped up in a towel, placed in a box and driven inside a car by humans, eventually ending up inside a hospital for wild animals at New Mexico Wildlife Center (NMWC) in Española.

We treat as many as 800 injured and orphaned wild animals each year at NMWC, each one with the hope of returning it healthy to the wild. The hospital is generally not open to the public, so consider this your behind-the-scenes look at all that happens inside.

After the animal has a chance to rest in a relatively stress-free environment, the next step is a full assessment of its injuries and overall condition. The professional hospital staff, known as Wildlife Rehabilitators, carry the patient to the treatment area where they have access to many medications, wound dressing materials and other medical supplies. The staff carries out their exam in relative quiet, only whispering as they feel for fractured bones, look into eyes, ears and mouth, and assess balance and mobility. They make careful notes about their findings and may take one or more X-rays. The Rehabilitators will clean and bandage wounds, give supportive fluids, and then administer any initial pain medication that is needed before returning the animal to its dark and quiet hospital enclosure.

At this stage, one of the Wildlife Rehabilitators will usually consult with one of our veterinarians to create a care plan. Depending on its injury, the patient may





need treatments such as topical, oral or injectable medications, fluid therapy or regular bandage changes.

For example, one patient recently admitted to NMWC is a beautiful creature known as a black-crowned night heron. The bird has long legs and a long, pointed beak. During its initial exam the Wildlife Rehabilitator discovered a wound on the underside of one wing. An X-ray showed a fracture and a pellet from a BB gun lodged in the wing. The fracture was lined up very well and located in the middle of one of the "forearm" bones, so it was deemed likely to heal well with bandaging and would not require surgery. But the wound also had to be treated with topical antibiotics to prevent infection, and the wrap had to be changed daily. At first the heron required fluids to stabilize its condition and replace lost calories. Then it could be transitioned to eating solid food (in this case, rodents and fish). It is still undergoing treatment, but if all goes well, it will be moved out into an exercise pen to rebuild its strength before being returned to an area near where it was found.

At this time of year, our hospital also treats a large number of healthy orphaned animals. While some of these admissions come from situations where a mother was killed or for some reason abandoned her young, many more of them are brought to us by well-meaning people who did not realize they were separating babies from their parent(s). Our first attempt at treatment with young animals is to reunite these families whenever possible. Fawns can be returned to the resting place where their mother left them, and baby birds may be put back

When we do need to raise young wild orphans, it is a very labor-intensive process. Nestling songbirds may be fed as often as every 15 minutes for 12 hours every day. Young desert cottontails are fed less frequently, but they need to be kept away from all noise, fast movements and human smells, as they are incredibly sensitive to environmental stress.

Summer is the busiest time of year for our wildlife hospital because we receive so many young animals that are injured or simply orphaned. If you find a wild animal that appears to need assistance, please give us a call. If you are comfortable doing so, you can put the animal in a cardboard box until you can speak with one of our staff. Many times we can give our callers advice on how to reunite a mother and young. But if the animal is obviously hurt, it should be transported quickly and carefully to our hospital, or another licensed wildlife rehabilitator.

No one likes to have to go to the hospital, and wildlife even less so than people. It can be a difficult and bewildering place. But if a wild animal in northern New Mexico needs assistance, we are here to help. And the best moment of any week is when we can take one of these amazing creatures—a heron or fawn or hawk—back to where it belongs and watch it run, swim or fly away.

New Mexico Wildlife Center staff may be reached at (505) 753-9505. While the public is generally not allowed to go inside the hospital, visitors may tour the live animal displays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Our next annual open house, Oct. 5 and 6, will include tours of the hospital as well as many live animal programs.



STEP into State Museums and Historic Sites

You already know your local public library can

be a lifesaver during the summer. It offers activities, enrichment and programing for kids as well as a chance to escape from the scorching sun. And it's all for free.

But Santa Fe-area libraries offer another freebie that's perfect for the summer months: access to passes that get your family into a range of museums and cultural attractions in Santa Fe and across the state.

With your library card, you can check out a New Mexico Family Pass or a Share the Experience Pass for up to two weeks. You simply present the pass at your destination along with a New Mexico ID, and up to six people receive free basic admission.

The Share the Experience Pass, or STEP, available at all Santa Fe Public Library branches and Vista Grande Public Library in Eldorado, gets you into Santa Fe's Georgia O'Keeffe Museum, IAIA Museum of Contemporary Native Arts, The Santa Fe Botanical Garden and the Santa Fe Children's Museum. The Family Pass, available at libraries throughout New Mexico, covers admission to Santa Fe's New Mexico Museum of Art, New Mexico History Museum, Museum of International Folk Art and Museum of Indian Arts & Culture, as well as several other statewide destinations: New Mexico Museum of Natural History & Science and the National Hispanic Cultural Center, in Albuquerque; New Mexico Museum of Space History, in Alamogordo; New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, in Las Cruces; Los Luceros Historic Site, in Alcalde; the Lincoln Historic Site, in Lincoln; the Jemez Historic Site, just north of Jemez Springs; the Fort Sumner Historic Site/Bosque Redondo Memorial, in Fort Sumner; Fort Stanton, in Capitan; Fort Selden, in Radium Springs; and the Coronado Historic Site, in Bernalillo.

The only hitch: The passes are available on a first-come, first-served basis, so you can't guarantee you'll be able to snag one for a planned vacation. Stop by or call any circulation desk and ask if there are any passes available, or search for them on your library's website to check current availability. The Santa Fe Public Library's branches have 16 Family Passes and 22 Share the Experience passes in all.
