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Tickets are only sold in packages: a \$32 package admits one adult and two children per performance; a \$56 package admits two adults and three children per performance; additional children's tickets are \$8 per performance. Tickets for young adults (ages 15-22) are also \$8 per performance.

# Salad Days to New Entrées

#### Spring-cleaning, like

morning sickness, can be a bit of a misnomer. Sometimes these urges follow an agenda of their own, oblivious to the hour or season.

Charles and I went on a housecleaning rampage recently after a winter more of the spirit than of the calendar. The long, dark season of discontent struck unexpectedly. Life seemed to be going smoothly. Our son is back in the country after years away, happily absorbed in graduate school at UNM. We're all in good health, with no great financial pressure. Perhaps this outward stability teased the demons down from the rafters. Old tensions led to fights that led to silences that drove us into therapy.

"Face it," our couples therapist snarked at the end of a session, several months in. "The relationship as you've known it is over." I'm guessing they didn't teach hand-holding in his psych school, or he failed that class. I'd swear I actually saw him make a tiny gesture of a cross, as if administering last rites.

But it wasn't the marriage whose death he was anointing. It was this chapter of our lives whose passage he saw us resisting: our salad years of starting a family, making a home, shaping our careers.

And what a lush and verdant phase it was, magical years of creation and re-creation: having a child, saving clips from his first haircut, buying a tiny house that we expanded and adapted, practicing spelling words with him, beaming through music recitals, raising chickens and snakes, shaping our boy's youth while healing wounds from our own.

"Empty nest" and "midlife crisis" are tired clichés, until they ring true. When we have a small family, as so many of us now do, the familycentered years can end abruptly. We also tend to live longer than previous generations. This calls on us to create new chapters of our lives if we're not to grow stale, or grow apart.

Neither of my grandmothers was conversant with empty nesting. Both married in their teens and had a houseful of children by the time they turned 20. My father's mother had her last child after Dad moved out at 19, and by the time her last children were on their own she was already a grandmother. My mother's mother had several grandchildren by the time she was my age. These women lived their entire adult lives in relation to children.

Charles and I had our one child when we were 30. That little bird fledged early, first on a high-school study-abroad program, then to college, a year in Spain and a year in Germany. Even now that he has flown back to New Mexico, we just see him for occasional weekends and celebrations. "Grand-birds" aren't part of the conversation yet.

I thought we had adjusted by now to this extra space in the nest, but Charles and I went through this

transition — much like the transition into parenthood 25 years ago — on a different timeframe. Motherhood began changing me as soon as my body experienced the first signs of pregnancy. Fatherhood transformed Charles utterly but more gradually, since he didn't carry and feed a child with his own body.

Likewise this period of unwinding from the day-to-day intensity of childrearing hit us differently. Ariel's departure to college several years ago left me dopey and unmoored, even as I began enjoying the emotional space opened up by his departure. Empty nest hit Charles in slow motion, ultimately colliding with that other too-real cliché: midlife crisis. He took an unscheduled (and unannounced) hiatus from work. We swung from raging tempests to icy silences. We entered therapy. We slogged. We slogged. We slogged.

And so we found ourselves one Sunday morning, unexpectedly, on a

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# **Infants & Toddlers**

#### I am originally from Texas, home to two of the

country's 12 milk banks and the Human Milk Banking Association of North America. When I became pregnant, I had no doubt that I would breastfeed. I went to Dar a Luz Birth & Health Center in Albuquerque for my prenatal care. I had done all of my research and chose breastfeeding as the healthiest, most economical option for my family. I knew that experts recommend exclusive breastfeeding for six months, and I never entertained the idea of not breastfeeding exclusively for that long. So I was devastated when I was diagnosed with insufficient glandular tissue to produce enough milk for my baby. Despite feeding around the clock and pumping nonstop, I found I was unable breastfeed exclusively and had to supplement with formula.

Even though I couldn't change how much milk I was making, I continued to agonize about feeding my daughter formula. Being familiar with milk banks, I sought one out, and I was astonished to find that the closest milk bank was in Denver. Many phone calls, emails and meetings later I was able to facilitate a partnership between Dar a Luz and the Denver Mothers' Milk Bank.

A *milk bank* screens, collects, processes and dispenses donated human milk as a community service for mothers who cannot supply enough milk to meet their babies' needs. A *milk depot* is a healthcare facility that keeps a freezer for collecting milk from screened donors and then ships it to the milk bank for distribution to hospitals or individuals. Hospitals in Albuquerque already use donated breast milk from donors all over the country. Beginning in April, Dar a Luz began serving as a depot site for the Denver Mothers' Milk Bank. Now New Mexicans have the opportunity to donate milk to babies in need in our state.

The Denver Mothers' Milk Bank primarily serves babies in neonatal intensive care units, which typically include babies born prematurely and those with feeding intolerance, immune problems, hypoglycemia, jaundice, gut priming, trophic feeds, allergies and metabolic disorders. The bank believes in getting every baby off to a good start in life, so when milk is available, it will also fill prescriptions for healthy newborns, such as mine, whose mothers cannot produce enough milk to meet their needs.

Prior to donating milk, donors are screened. To serve as a donor, a woman must be the mother of a baby less than a year old. She must be a nonsmoker and not be using any type of nicotine product or medications during the time the milk is collected, with the exception of progestin-only birth control, vitamins, minerals, food supplements and replacement hormones such as insulin or thyroid. Limited use of caffeine is acceptable. A waiting period is required after alcohol use before donating milk.

Interested donors begin the process with a 10- to 15-minute phone screening (303-868-1888), followed by completion of an informational packet. They must have a blood test (performed at Dar a Luz, at the expense of the Denver Milk Bank, or at their doctor's office) to screen for HIV I/II (AIDS), HTLV-I/ II (human T-cell leukemia/lymphoma), hepatitis B or C or syphilis. Then they simply drop off pumped milk at Dar a Luz or make their own arrangements to get their milk to the Denver bank.

In addition to the screening process, donated milk goes through procedures and tests to assure its safety for babies. It is tested for bacterial counts before being pasteurized at a temperature that kills bacteria and viruses while still

preserving the milk's unique immune properties. After pasteurization the milk is retested to make sure the treatment was effective. A postpasteurization bacterial culture must comply with standards of no growth. The milk is analyzed with a near-infrared scope that shows protein, calories

Santa Fe mothers who want to donate but do not want to drive all the way to Albuquerque have a simple alternative: Volunteers who live in Santa Fe will take turns driving to Dar a Luz to drop off milk.

The World Health Organization's 2002 hierarchy of infant feeding options ranks breastfeeding as the optimal choice, followed by expressed milk from an infant's own mother's breast-milk or from a healthy wet-nurse or human-milk bank, and then a breastmilk substitute (formula).

A milk bank thus serves a vital role in providing life-saving nourishment for infants. For some premature babies, just one ounce provides a day's worth

of nutrition. If you add an extra ounce each time you pump and donate it, you can save the life of a newborn child and help mothers who can't produce milk for their babies. The Mothers' Milk Bank relies on the goodness of donations from nursing mothers. So please consider donating. It's a small way to make a huge impact.

# Nurturing the Future

World Breastfeeding Week brings support "Close to Mothers"

Save the date! August 1 marks the beginning of World Breastfeeding Week 2013.

Endorsed by the World Health Organization and UNICEF, World Breastfeeding Week was birthed back in 1992, through the efforts of World Alliance for Breastfeeding Action (WABA) to generate public awareness and support for breastfeeding. WABA is a global network of individuals and agencies whose aim is to promote and protect breastfeeding. WA-BA's mission is based on the Innocenti Declaration, adopted at the WHO/UNICEF policy makers meeting on "Breastfeeding in the 90s: A Global Initiative" in Florence, Italy in the summer of 1990, to support efforts to increase women's confidence in their ability to breastfeed and to identify and eliminate obstacles to breastfeeding within the health system, the workplace and the community.

The Innocenti recommends that all birthing facilities adopt its "10 Steps to Successful Breastfeeding," also known as the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative (BFHI):

- 1) Have a written breastfeeding policy that is routinely communicated to all health care staff.
- 2) Train all health care staff in skills necessary to implement the policy.
- 3) Inform all pregnant women about the benefits and management of breastfeeding.
- 4) Help mothers initiate breastfeeding within one half-hour of birth.

- 5) Show mothers how to breastfeed and maintain lactation even if they should be separated from their infants.
- 6) Give newborn infants no food or drink other than breastmilk, unless medically indicated.
- 7) Practice "rooming in" that is, allow mothers and infants to remain together 24 hours a day.
- 8) Encourage breastfeeding on demand.
- 9) Give no artificial teats or pacifiers.
- 10) Foster the establishment of breastfeeding support groups and refer mothers to them on discharge from the hospital or clinic.

Once a hospital adopts these 10 steps, it can be designated as "Baby Friendly." Since the BFHI began, more than 15,000 facilities in 134 countries have been awarded Baby-Friendly status. In areas where hospitals have earned this designation. more mothers are breastfeeding their infants, and child health has improved.

Currently there are no Baby-Friendly hospitals in New Mexico. Through a grant received by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, however, the New Mexico Breastfeeding Task Force is working to improve maternity care services across the state. At present, nine New Mexico hospitals are on the path to Baby-Friendly status, and we hope there will be more in the future. This year Christus St. Vincent Regional Medical Center here in Santa Fe won the Task Force's "Ban the Bag" award, meaning

they no longer give out hospital discharge bags with formula to postpartum moms. Giving out free formula samples has been found not only to discourage a mother's choice to begin breastfeeding but also to negatively affect breastfeeding duration and exclusivity.

Now in its 23<sup>rd</sup> year, World Breastfeeding Week is celebrated in at least 120 countries across the globe between August 1 and 7. Each year the event has a different theme; this year's is "Breastfeeding Support: Close to Mothers," highlighting the importance of peer-counselor support. Peer counselors are women with successful breastfeeding experience and training who support new mothers with breastfeeding. They serve as role models and provide much-needed breastfeeding advice and encouragement for women during the postpartum period. Studies have found that when women have contact with peer counselors before giving birth, breastfeeding initiation rates are higher. Peer counselors also play a role in increasing the duration of breastfeeding.

In Santa Fe, a family-friendly World Breastfeeding Week event will be held at the Children's Museum from noon to 5 p.m. on August 2, with information booths, refreshments, games and prizes.

#### "Perhaps the biggest challenge facing 4-H

throughout New Mexico and the rest of the country is that many people think that it is only about kids and cows," says Christina M. Turner, agricultural agent for Santa Fe County 4-H. I'll readily admit that I was one of them. I never really considered enrolling my daughters in 4-H; we can barely manage our large family dog.

My perception of 4-H changed when I met the Baca family, who for 12 years has been involved in the 4-Seasons 4-H Club. Julia, age 14, and Lila, age 12, do more than just raise livestock. They sew, knit, learn about photography and art, and bake, as part of their 4-H club, one of eight in Santa Fe County. This year 4-Seasons participants learned how to sheer a sheep, and now the children are in the process of washing and culling the wool to spin into yarn that they will knit into scarves and other items.

Turner notes that 4-H — which stands for Head, Heart, Hands and Health offers over 200 different projects, ranging from livestock to computers to pets to rocketry. "We offer research-based curricula to help youth and adult volunteers master these subjects," picking up valuable leadership skills in the process, Turner explains. Programs offered through 4-H emphasize mentorship, science, healthy lifestyle choices and promoting civic responsibility.

"The list of opportunities really is astonishing," says Natalie Baca, mother of Ellie Powell, 24, along with Lila and Julia. "We joke that Ellie got her scholarship [to Baylor University in Waco, Texas] because of 4-H. We had scholarship committee members telling us they'd never seen such a poised high-schooler before. All those years of public speaking!"

"I proudly can say 4-H changed my life," says Ellie, who quickly rattles off money management and respect as some of the life lessons she learned in 4-H. "Not only did [4-H] help get me an NCAA scholarship, but the livestock judging team has even helped me with a foundation in swine, which I am now working with for my PhD in genetics and bioinformatics."

Julia adds, "Our older sister still says, 'Set goals, work hard to achi eve them,

and be proud of the results.' I think she is spot-on there, and Lila and I still keep that in mind when we do anything in life."

"You can't ask for a better way to raise your own children into thoughtful, competent, community-minded adults," Natalie says, reflecting on the many families in the club, each with their own specialties — whether it's lambs or preserving, computers or horses. The families are committed both to the program and the friends they've made through years of working together. "Take our leader, Deanna Runer. She's raised three boys through the program."

Lila notes that projects from sewing to baking to showing goats have given her an appreciation for a broad range of cultural activities. "I can admire the work and creativity that goes into a knitted sweater and the time it took to perfectly train a horse," she says.

That's not to say 4-H is always fun. Ellie truly disliked raising chickens, and Lila struggles with handling sheep, particularly after one knocked her down and broke her glasses.

Then there are the struggles with their friends' misconceptions.

"My friends who aren't in 4-H think it's lame," says Lila. "They don't understand much about it. I sometimes bring them to our house to see and handle the animals. Many kids don't have this opportunity and should."

"We are not hicks," Julia pipes in.

But the most pressing issue all three young ladies mention is the decline in membership. "Even Lila and I see these changes in the last six or seven years we've done 4-H," says Julia. "Many clubs grow increasingly smaller. It's sad."

Yet the family remains upbeat and involved with their club, currently raising horses, sheep, goats, chickens and rabbits for their favorite event: Santa Fe County Fair, August 2 to 5.

For the 4-H community, County Fair is the culmination of their year-long effort. "It is by far the most insane week anybody would ever dare to go through, but it's great," says Lila. The girls have to prepare each animal individually. "Can you

imagine how long it takes to wash and dry 25 chickens?" Julia asks.

Each time they show animals, they learn something new. T hey may take home several ribbons one year and none the next year. Some 4-H-ers sell animals they took care of every day for more than a year, which Ellie notes is not always as easy as outsiders think. One year, she said, "A little girl made sale with her champion rabbit. She sold it at the livestock auction but cried and cried to part with her animal. The buyer knelt down and gave her back her rabbit, and she just sobbed and hugged him. That will stay with me forever."

Joining In

In 1912, demonstration trains featuring specialists from New Mexico A & M (now New Mexico State University) traveled around the state, working with rural communities to improve agriculture output, livestock and home economics skills. These demonstrations eventually led to development of 4-H clubs throughout the state.

"4-H has been in New Mexico for over 100 years, and 4-H has changed with the times in order to meet the needs of the people," says Christina M. Turner.

Today, Santa Fe County has eight clubs in Santa Fe, Edgewood, Eldorado and Stanley, with over 300 members split fairly evenly between boys and girls. Children must be 5 years old to join. Helping kids fall in love with the natural world

#### "We teach kids basic manners:

saying hello and goodbye and thank you," mused Griet Laga, founder of Arts of Nature, a Santa Fe outdoor education program. "Why don't we teach kids to have the same manners for the natural world? Why don't we teach them to salute a trail before they start a hike or to greet a meadow before they enter it?"


Laga and I were meeting over a cup of tea to discuss her work and ideas for activities parents can do with their children over the summer. On a quest to compile a heap of summer activities for my own family and Tumbleweeds readers, I knew that her knowledge of experiential and outdoor education would make her an advisor worth consulting. The virtues of gratitude and reciprocity quickly made their way into our conversation.

"We tend to move so fast," she said, "that we don't have our senses open to even notice what the world around us is doing. [We say], that sunset 'grabbed my attention' or that cactus 'caught my eye,' but then we don't take time to stop and say, 'Thank you, world, for getting my attention and making me notice something beautiful."

The practice of thankfulness and giving back are big components of the Arts of Nature paradigm. Three years ago, while homeschooling one of her two children, Laga felt moved to put together a curriculum that would help people of all ages develop a deep love for and sincere connection with the natural world, other people and the self, and to use that place of love and connection to delve into the ecological issues we face today.

"We can't work on our ecological issues from a place of fear and anxiety, but rather a place of love and wonder and delight," Laga said. She feels it's important, especially when working with youth, to teach and foster a positive connection with the environment and ecology. "My hope is that participants of Arts of Nature will fall in love with the world around them. Environmental leadership will come through falling in love."

Laga and her fellow educators at Arts of Nature use active awareness activities, wilderness skills training, naturalist studies, performing arts and participation in community festivals as vehicles for growing that positive connection. Here are some of their ideas for summer days.



#### At (or close to) home:

1) Set up meals and snacks to enjoy with your kids outside. You don't have to sweep up the crumbs, and it's fun to watch the light change and wave to passers-

2) Round up your kiddos and just sit quietly in your garden or neighborhood park. Your kids may not sit still for long, but as Laga says, "Kids are willing to stop, but no one tells them to. They *need* periods of silence."

3) Make it feel like a camping expedition by sleeping in the yard, right under the stars or in a tent.

4) Organize with other families to play games at your neighborhood park. Invite adults and kids to participate. Kids love to watch the adults compete. These games can be simple: kick-the-can, tag, hide-and-go-seek, baseball, paper airplane competitions or sack races.

#### Out of town:

1) The beaver pond at the end of Cerro Gordo Road is close to town but feels like it isn't. The pond is on the Nature Conservancy's Santa Fe Canyon Preserve Trail. There is a large parking area off Cerro Gordo Road just a few yards from its intersection with Upper Canyon Road. Signs for the trail will lead you from the parking area. Dogs are not allowed.

2) Big Tesuque Trail offers beckoning aspen groves and a mountain creek. If you walk uphill away from the parking area and off-trail to the right, you'll find stick structures that hikers have built with bits of branches and driftwood from the creek. If you cross the road and follow the stream downhill you'll find more stick houses, a sweet little clearing and good places to play in the creek.

Both the upstream and downstream trails start at Big Tesuque Campground. To reach the campground, drive 11.5 miles up New Mexico Highway 475/Hyde Park Road (also known as the Ski Basin road). You'll see a sign marking the campground. The uphill trail heads right out of the parking lot. To find the trail going downhill, cross Hyde Park Road, walk up alongside the road a few yards, and you'll see a trail dropping back down towards the stream. Be careful crossing the road, as its winding nature makes for blind spots, and cars often travel too fast. Keep dogs and children close while crossing.

3) Hike the Dale Ball Trails, a network of 22 beautiful miles of well-marked hiking and biking trails through the foothills of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, on the edge of town. Head towards Picacho Peak or Atalaya Mountain (you don't have to make it to the top). Let your kids set the pace and see what they discover. There are dozens of Dale Ball trailheads and countless loops to explore. My kids and I like heading up toward Picacho from the same parking lot used for the Santa Fe Canyon Preserve Trail (see first entry). Instead of heading for the preserve, take the trail that veers off to right, cross both the Santa Fe River and Upper Canyon Road, and after a few yards you'll find yourself on a shady canyon trail. For a PDF of the trail map, go to www.santafenm.gov, click "Hiking and Biking Trails" on the Visitors pull-down menu, then click the link to Dale Ball Trails Map.

4) Take a dinner picnic to any of these spots. Notice how the light and mood change. Ask your kids if they hear different animals or if the forest itself makes special evening or nighttime noises.

#### The Secret Spot

The Secret Spot is an extension of Laga's advice on giving children opportunities to stop and sit quietly. Help your kids find a Secret Spot either in your yard, your garden, your park or on your favorite hike. Give them time to simply be in that space. Ask them to notice changes:

- 1) What are the birds doing at different times of the day? How do the cycles of the day, the night and the seasons affect their Secret Spot?
- 2) Is there a plant sprouting and growing? Do they know what kind of plant it is?
- 3) Is there evidence of animals or insects passing through?
- 4) Do they feel different when they're in their Secret Spot?
- 5) Invite them to keep a log about what they notice and how they feel.

# techno-tourism for kids and families

Be an astronaut, film director or designer at New Mexico museums

#### When most people think of technology, they

probably think of computers, electrical grids, new medical devices and high-end electrical innovations. We may forget that technology exists in virtually every area of our lives. When I began contacting New Mexico organizations for great "techie" options for local and visiting kids and families this summer, Elena Baca, External Relations Coordinator at ¡Explora!, responded: "What's interesting about 'technology' is that, to us, a rubber band is technology."

And she's right. The word "technology" needs to be defined in an appropriate context. As it relates to educational programming and events for children and families, technology is about discovery and about the tools that enable imagination, creativity and learning. Here are a few of the best places where your family can explore technological innovation this summer and learn more about how it transforms our lives.

• The Santa Fe Children's Museum (1050 Old Pecos Trail, (505) 989-8359) recently added two programs that involve both new and "classic" technologies.

The brand-new Makerspace is a place where, as its name suggests, kids can "learn how to bring things from their imagination to life," according to Franki Williams, Makerspace coordinator. The creative space, geared toward youth 8 to 18 years old, is outfitted with familiar and not-so-familiar technologies including sewing machines, soldering irons, digital cameras, a 3-D printer and a computer lab. Workshops by skilled members of the community teach young people how to use available tools to create whatever they imagine.

Since opening in February, Makerspace has hosted workshops in 3-D printing, paper stop-motion, game programming and sewing. Ultimately, the museum hopes that "the space will really be run by [youth]," Williams said, and that newer generations will see older Makerspace members as mentors who can help them bring their ideas to fruition. Access to Makerspace is available during workshops, with museum admission and a small fee for materials. Call Williams at 989-8359 x 117 for information about upcoming workshops.

On the third Saturday of every month, the Children's Museum hosts a Kid's Night Out, focused on animation and film, giving kids 4 to 11 extra time at the museum and giving parents a few hours to themselves. The evening begins with a healthy dinner, after which the young participants break up into groups to work on film projects.

Past activities have included claymation, pixilation and stop-motion animation. Sometimes children watch examples of the project at hand or a short instructional film. At the end of the night, everyone's finished work is shared on a projector screen. Parents are invited to come early to watch the work of their young filmmakers. These hands-on film projects allow participants to learn about the technological process and creativity behind the illusion of animation, in a way that gives them deeper appreciation of the final products. For example, when museum staff initially asks the children how they think a film like "Fantasia" is made, they always respond, "with computers." The film series teaches them that for every few moments of the film, there are multiple frames, each hand-drawn with extreme attention to detail. Cost per child for the workshop is



\$30, and space is limited. Those interested in having their child participate can call 989-8359 x 112.

• Bradbury Science Museum (1350 Central Avenue, Los Alamos, (505) 667-4444) allows free public access to a plethora of historical, technological and declassified scientific information from the Los Alamos National Laboratories. Exhibits include artifacts and documents from the Manhattan Project and models of atomic bombs. The museum features historical projects as well as current projects and research conducted at the labs. The "TechLab" offers hands-on activities and science exhibits for all ages.

Visitors can watch several films, including one about the origins of the "town that never was," dating back to the early days of Los Alamos in the 1940s. This summer the museum will be open until 8 p.m. on select evenings and will feature demos and talks on subjects such as high-speed imaging and nanotechnology. The museum also hosts a monthly lecture series, along with many other community events year-round. To learn more about specific dates and events visit the Bradbury Science Museum's website www.lanl.gov/museum.

• Challenger Learning Center of New Mexico (1776 Montaño Road NW, Los Ranchos de Albuquerque, (505) 248-1776) provides year-round programming on outer space for schools and the public. Programs include space mission simulators in which participants form teams that act out the roles of astronauts (in a model spacecraft) and Mission Control, to cooperatively complete an assigned mission. Missions, typically undertaken by whole school classrooms, are available and open to the public every other month, and groups 15 and over can inquire about scheduling their own. During the summer the

center offers over 10 camps, including Junior Rocketry and Robotics, and International Space Station Camp where participants are taught to construct a 22-foot model of an International Space Station, or ISS, underwater. Visit www.challengernm.org or call the museum to see a full list of camps or to inquire about missions and other events.

• ¡Explora! (1701 Mountain Road NW, Albuquerque, (505) 224-8300), a family-friendly science center, describes itself as part learning center, part children's museum, part Grandma's attic, part Grandpa's garage and part laboratory. ¡Explora! prides itself on table-top sized exhibits with manipulatives that are hand-sized and designed to be engaging.

For example, one new exhibit explores the properties of light. You can make a green chile appear black or a yellow flower appear red. Experiments with light, optics, color and perception offer clues into the principles of physics, math and biology. Other activities in this exhibit include refracting light with different lenses and exploring how various lights and movement can make interesting and surprising shadows.


Educational programs include camps, afterschool clubs, field trips and outreach. Prices vary, so call or visit www.explora.us to inquire about summer camps, youth internships, special events and visitor information.

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# for Teens, by Teens

Española program grows hope and opportunity

#### Imagine a small community in rural Northern

New Mexico with a secret garden that only a few know about.

The garden is cared for by the local teens that come together a couple of days a week to tend and nurture it in the spring, summer and fall. Even though it's a lot of work, these teens know they are growing more than just vegetables. They are growing friendships, growing healthier, and learning to improve their lives and their community.

Northern Youth Project (NYP) has made this all possible for teens in the Española Valley. NYP helps these teens make healthy choices in their own lives and encourages them to pass on their knowledge and skills.

In 2009, several teen workers at the local Boys & Girls Club del Norte in Abiquiú started talking and dreaming about a program specifically for teenagers. The club was such a success for the younger kids; why not create a program for teens? One determined adult volunteer, Leona Hillary, guided them through the many months of overwhelming steps to create their own program. She is still organizing and mentoring them today, now as the NYP program director.

NYP is a place "for teens, by teens," in the beautiful Upper Rio Chama Valley. For four years NYP has been "supporting the dreams of northern New Mexico

teens through art, agriculture, entrepreneurialism and community service projects that honor the past and look to the future." The local teens have created a heritage garden, performed community service projects, learned various crafts, and planned and executed fundraisers with external support. To date, over 400 volunteer-hours and thousands of dollars of in-kind goods and services have been donated. According to Hillary, the main goal is to encourage teens to be engaged in positive behavior.

Now imagine the same group of teens holding their meetings at various places throughout the year but rarely meeting at the same place twice. NYP as an organization is homeless. They have land where they grow a garden, but no building to permanently house them for meetings, projects and recreation, or to provide storage for their tools and supplies. The group mostly meets outside at

the garden, weather-permitting, but otherwise at various locations in Abiquiú, like the Pueblo de Abiquiú Library and Cultural Center or Rising Moon Gallery and Art Center.


The community has stepped up by lending space and donating time, services and supplies. Jaye Buros, owner of Rising Moon, has helped by encouraging performance art, visual art and participation in community events. Buros has

> been involved with the teens for two years. She enjoys helping them now find their place in the world, having taught many of them in kindergarten. Local photographer and teacher Leihzel Baybayan has taught teen photography workshops and continues her support as an art mentor. Over the course of several weeks, teens took their own pictures, printed them, then showcased and sold them at the Abiquiú Studio Tour.

> Teens who participate in extracurricular activities are more successful than teens that do not. It has been proven that students in such programs, including those currently in NYP, make better decisions and invest more in their education and communities. NYP teens under 18 show higher academic performance within one year of joining the program, while 100 percent of teens over 18 have graduated high school and now attend college. This alone is proof that NYP

is working, since according to the United States Department of Education, the 2011 rate of four-year high school graduation for the service area was a grim 45.2 percent.

Founding member Anastasia Maestas, currently a teen leadership council member, said, "NYP has kept me out of trouble by giving me something to do, and it has helped me grow up." She thinks the energy and enthusiasm generated by the members about the program is the main reason why more teens have joined. With more new teens joining and redesigning the current program based on all the teens' needs and interests, they gather as an interconnected group and go out and share activities: gardening, cooking, community service projects and fiestas. "This is a good thing because, until now, none of the teens really knew anybody else in the community outside their own families," Maestas said.

Now 36 teenagers are members, and some bring their younger siblings, too. Matias Coronado, age 12, one of NYP's newest members, hopes to be the president of the program when he has gained more experience. A member since August 2012, he knows that "We are small right now, and we don't keep a lot of kids out of trouble, like using drugs or bullying, but we will get more kids and keep more of them out of trouble."

Parents are pleased with the program because they know that their son or daughter is safe and working with the community to make it a better place. Tara Reyes, mother of teen member Darian Reyes, agrees: "I think the NYP keeps the teens busy and out of trouble, which helps them to know what they want to do in the future."

Teens elect officers to help govern the program, allowing them to take on more responsibility and invest into helping their program grow. NYP supports teens in communicating with each other and working well with others. It is a huge learning experience, working with friends and different people. NYP also offers opportunities for guest teachers and volunteers to help out local teens in need. The community's efforts have been rewarded as the teens gives back by offering organic produce to local families at little to no cost, stuffing Christmas stockings for children in foster care, and picking up litter at Abiquiú Lake.

Do not be fooled by this group's small numbers and its rural location; these teens are powerful, inspired and inspiring! They deserve support, care and a

home as they work to support the dreams of rural northern New Mexico teens. Everyone at NYP shares a vision of one day having a building the teens can call their own. NYP has an opportunity to obtain a portable building to house the program; however with limited funds and manpower, the program needs a probono licensed contractor or construction company for plans, labor and transport service, and donations of cement, backhoe work and money for the project. Northern Youth Project is an independent program under the fiscal sponsorship of the Trés Semillas Foundation, Inc., a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, and donations are tax-deductible.

You can help NYP be more successful in a number of additional ways. Become a "Nifty Fifty/Tremendous Twenty" supporter by pledging recurring donations. Contribute a garden shed to house tools and supplies. Donate supplies such as bottled water or healthy nonperishable snacks, office supplies, photography equipment or garden tools. Visit the website often for ways to help support NYP's projects, fundraisers and activities.

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# IGracias, arco iris!

Cómo ayudar a los niños a enamorarse del mundo de la naturaleza

"A los niños les enseñamos

buenos modales: a saludar y a dar las gracias", reflexionó Griet Laga, fundadora de Arts of Nature (Las artes de la naturaleza), un programa de educación al aire libre de Santa Fe. "¿Por qué no les enseñamos a que tengan los mismos buenos modales para el mundo de la naturaleza? ¿Por qué no les enseñamos a saludar al sendero antes de que empiecen una caminata o a la pradera antes de que entren en ella?"

Laga y yo nos reunimos a tomar un té y hablar de su trabajo e ideas para actividades que los padres de familia puedan hacer con sus hijos en el verano. En una misión de averiguar sobre actividades para mi propia familia y los lectores de Tumbleweeds, sabía que por su conocimiento y experiencia de la educación al aire libre valdría la pena consultar con ella. Las virtudes de la gratitud y reciprocidad inmediatamente entraron a formar parte de nuestra conversación.

no tenemos los sentidos abiertos ni siguiera para observar lo que el mundo a nuestro alrededor hace," dijo. "Pero está en nuestro lenguaje: Esa puesta del sol 'llamó mi atención' o ese cactus 'atrajo mi mirada, pero luego no nos tomamos el tiempo para detenernos y decir: 'gracias tierra por llamar mi atención y hacerme ver algo bello."

La práctica de la gratitud y de devolver algo son grandes partes del paradigma de las Artes de la naturaleza. Hace tres años, mientras enseñaba en casa a uno de sus dos hijos, Laga dijo que se sintió inclinada a preparar un programa de estudios que ayudara a las personas de todas las edades a desarrollar un profundo amor y sincera conexión con el mundo de la naturaleza, con otras personas y con sí mismas y a usar ese lugar de amor y conexión para ahondar en los problemas ecológicos a los que nos enfrentamos hoy en día.

"No podemos trabajar en nuestros problemas ecológicos desde una posición de miedo y ansiedad, sino de un lugar de amor, deslumbramiento y deleite", dijo Laga. Especialmente cuando uno trabaja con jóvenes, Laga dice que siente que eso es importante para enseñar y cultivar una conexión positiva con el medio ambiente y la ecología. "Espero que los participantes en las Artes de la naturaleza se enamoren del mundo que les rodea. El liderazgo en el campo del medio ambiente se desarrollará por medio de ese amor."

> Laga y sus colegas en las Artes de la naturaleza usan actividades de concienciación, entrenamiento en habilidades para sobrevivir en la selva. estudios naturalistas, artes escénicas y participación en festivales comunitarios como vehículos para cultivar esa conexión positiva. Aquí están algunas de sus ideas para los días de verano.

#### En la casa o cerca de ella

1) Coma o tome sus meriendas con sus niños al aire libre. No hay que recoger las migas y es divertido ver cómo cambia la luz y saludar a la gente que ven pasar.

2) Salga a sentarse silenciosamente con sus niños en el jardín o un parque cercano. Puede que los niños no se queden sentados por mucho tiempo, pero como Laga dijo: "Los niños están dispuestos a parar, pero nadie les dice que lo hagan. Necesitan momentos de silencio".

3) Haga como que si estuvieran de campamento: duerman en el patio, bajo las estrellas o en una tienda de campaña.

4) Con otras familias organice juegos en el parque de su vecindario. Inviten a adultos y niños. A los pequeños les encanta ver a los adultos competir. Los juegos pueden ser simples: fútbol con una lata en lugar de pelota, corre que te pillo, escondidas, béisbol, o competencias de aviones de papel o carreras de costales.

#### Fuera de la ciudad

1) El estanque de castores al final del Cerro Gordo Road queda cerca pero parece que estuviera lejos de la ciudad. Está en la Nature Conservancy del sendero de Santa Fe Canyon Preserve. Hay un estacionamiento grande a unas pocas cuadras del cruce de Cerro Gordo Road y Upper Canyon Road y rótulos que le indican cómo llegar al sendero desde el estacionamiento. No se permiten perros.

2) El sendero Big Tesuque ofrece atractivos bosques de álamos temblones y un riachuelo. Si sube la colina desde el estacionamiento hacia la derecha (fuera del

sendero), encontrará estructuras de palos que los caminantes han armado con las ramas y madera que encuentran a su paso. Al cruzar el camino y seguir el riachuelo hacia abajo, encontrará más de esas estructuras de palos, un espacio abierto y buenos lugares para jugar en el riachuelo.

Ambos senderos río arriba y río abajo empiezan en el campamento Big Tesuque. Para llegar allí, conduzca 11,5 millas en la carretera 475/Hyde Park Road (también conocida como Ski Basin Road). Verá las señales del campamento. El sendero cuesta arriba empieza justo al salir del estacionamiento. Para hallar el sendero cuesta abajo, cruce Hyde Park Road, vaya por el camino unas cuantas yardas y encontrará el caminito que lo conducirá al riachuelo. Tenga cuidado al cruzar pues las curvas dificultan ver a distancia y a veces los carros van muy rápido. Mantenga a los niños y a los perros cerca de usted.

3) Pasee por los senderos Dale Ball, 22 hermosas millas con senderos bien marcados para caminar y montar bicicleta en las faldas de las montañas Sangre de Cristo, a las orillas de la ciudad. Vaya rumbo al Picacho Peak o la montaña Atalaya (no es necesario que llegue hasta la cima). Deje que los niños establezcan el ritmo de la caminata y vean qué descubren. Hay docenas de caminitos y trayectorias circulares para explorar. A mis hijos y a mí nos gusta subir al Picacho desde el mismo estacionamiento que se usa para ir al sendero Santa Fe Canyon Preserve (ver 1). En lugar de ir a la reserva ecológica tome el sendero que torna hacia la derecha, cruce ambos el río Santa Fe y el Upper Canyon Road y en unas cuantas yardas estará en un sendero sombreado del cañón. Hay un mapa del sendero en www.santafenm.gov: en el menú para visitantes haga 'clic' en "Hiking and Biking Trails" y luego en "Dale Ball Trails Map".

4) Vaya a cenar a cualquiera de estos lugares. Observe cómo la luz y el ambiente cambian. Pregúnteles a sus hijos si escuchan diferentes animales o si el mismo bosque hace ruidos especiales al anochecer.


#### El lugar secreto

El lugar secreto es una extensión de los consejos de Laga de dar a los niños oportunidades para detenerse y sentarse tranquilamente. Ayude a sus niños a encontrar un lugar secreto en el patio de su casa o en el jardín, su parque o caminata favoritos. Permítales que simplemente pasen un rato en ese espacio. Pídales que observen los cambios:

- 1) ¿Qué hacen los pájaros a diferentes horas del día? ¿Cómo los ciclos del día, la noche y las estaciones afectan su lugar secreto?
- 2) ¿Hay alguna planta brotando o creciendo allí? ¿Saben qué clase es?
- 3) ¿Hay indicios de animales o insectos que pasen por allí?
- 4) ¿Se sienten diferentes cuando están en su lugar secreto?
- 5) Invítelos a tomar notas de lo que observan y de cómo se sienten.

# Pools, Parks, Preserves & More

Tumbleweeds' tips for cheap summer thrills

#### Pools

Bicentennial Pool

(1043 Alto Street, 955-4778) This is Santa Fe's outdoor public pool, located at the Alto Bicentennial Park and Pool complex, with a sweet tot pool and a small slide, and a full-sized pool for bigger, more capable swimmers. There's not much cover, so bring your hat and parasol.

Fort Marcy Pool

(490 Bishop's Lodge Road, 955-2511) An anchor of the Fort Marcy Recreation Complex (which also includes a gym, basketball court, playground, field and running track), the full-sized pool is open daily for laps and recreational use, and the tot pool is popular with the little ones.

Genoveva Chavez Community Center (3221 W Rodeo, 955-4000)

The four pools offered at this complex include an Olympic-sized pool and adjacent waterplay area for kids of all ages, a therapy pool and an exciting water slide attracts the bigger

Sal<mark>vador Perez Swim</mark>ming Pool

(601 Alta Vista Street, 955-2604) Recreational swim sessions are limited at this indoor pool, but it is the site of youth team practices as well as swimming lessons for preschoolers and up.

#### Parks

Alto Bicentennial Park (1043 Alto Street)

After swimming in the Bicentennial Pool (see above), go for a picnic in the adjacent park banking the Santa Fe River. There is a large open field with beautiful shade trees, a playground for kids of all ages, and tennis and basketball courts.

Fort Marcy Park

(490 Bishop's Lodge Road) Part of the Fort Marcy Recreation Complex

(see above), this large park has imaginative, fun play structures, a big field for throwing Frisbees, and great paths for kids to practice riding bikes.

**Patrick Smith Park** 

(1001 Canyon Road)

The horse swings of a bygone era are missed, but the new equipment at this eastside park keeps the younger generation happy. This park also banks the Santa Fe River and offers a beautiful open field to run with the dog or play Frisbee.

Salvador Perez Park

(601 Alta Vista Street) This park has a real locomotive car, two great playgrounds (one for tots, one for bigger kids), a soccer field, baseball field, tennis courts and a volleyball court. It's a popular place for warm-weather birthday

The Railyard Park

(740 Cerrillos, 316-3596)

If you're new to Santa Fe, you won't remember when the Railyard sported just a few scrappy Siberian elms, a field of dirt choked with industrial waste, and heaps of blown garbage. Now the park is stunning. Local flora grace the paths, playground, gardens and grassy outdoor arena. Contemporary landscaping gives the park a metro — yet also very Santa Fe — feel. Go to railyardpark.org for directions and a calendar of events.

#### Preserves



**Leonora Curtin Wetland Preserve** (27283 I-25 West Frontage Road,

This 35-acre nature preserve just off the I-25 frontage road south of Santa Fe, adjacent

to El Rancho de las Golondrinas in the town of La Cienega, is maintained by the Santa Fe Botanical Garden. The trail through the preserve offers an easy walk through a lovely and rare marshland (cienega is Spanish for marsh), with diverse wetland plants and wildlife.

Ortiz Mountains Educational Preserve Covering 1,350 acres in the upper Ortiz Mountains, about 30 miles southwest of Santa Fe off the Turquoise Trail, this preserve includes Placer Peak, the highest peak in the

Ortiz range at 8,897 feet along with several historic mines.

F<mark>or more information</mark> about the Leonora Curtin Wetland Preserve, the Ortiz Mountains Educational Preserve, and the July grand opening of the Santa Fe Botanical Garden on Museum Hill, call 471-9103 or visit santafebotanicalgarden.org, where you'll find directions, maps and a calendar of events for each location.

Rapid treatment for facial or dental injuries makes all the difference • By Elizabeth Prishkulnik, DDS

#### It's summertime, and the livin's easy! Kids drag

out their bikes and scooters, hose off the trampoline, or head for the pool or basketball court.

Unfortunately, summer is also when our dental office encounters a dramatic increase in the incidence of activity-related orofacial trauma — injuries to the face and mouth — the main causes of which are sports injuries and assault related to adolescent alcohol use.

Think you don't know anything about orofacial trauma? Bet you know it when you see it, even if you are unfamiliar with the term. Orofacial trauma refers to any injury affecting soft and hard tissues of the face and mouth (oral cavity), including teeth. The least injurious effect is scraped tissue (abrasion), and the full range extends to crushed tissue (contusion), cuts (lacerations), forceful loss of tissue (avulsion), broken bones (fractures) and burns.

#### Know the good news from the bad

Many parents are surprised that oral cavity injuries are so bloody. The good news, however, is that even an insignificant oral injury can create impressive bleeding. Think how much blood you see when you nip your tongue. The mouth has an abundance of small blood vessels, hence its pink color. Healing is relatively speedy, however, thanks to this same profusion of small blood vessels that transport therapeutic products to repair damaged tissue. Further, because kids are, well, young, they heal faster than their folks do, often without complications.

The bad news is that some moderate or severe injuries do not bleed — externally — at all. For example, contusions bleed under the skin or mucosa, creating bruising, swelling, pain and pressure to adjacent structures. Similarly, fractured bones do not always bleed externally, unless accompanied by broken skin or mucosa, or by dislocated or avulsed teeth. Why is this bad news? Because lack of bleeding may translate to "trivial injury" for some parents, and their kids may not be promptly examined.

#### Early diagnosis improves outcome

A quick assessment immediately following trauma helps us determine if any neurological or life-threatening damage has occurred. Reports of loss of consciousness, vomiting or unexpected sleepiness indicate an urgent need for examination in the emergency room. One extreme example of such an injury is the head trauma suffered by actor Natasha Richardson in 2009. She experienced an epidural hematoma while skiing, creating bleeding under her skull and pressure against brain tissue. Initially refusing medical attention, she died from her injury several hours later. (Ms. Richardson was not wearing a protective helmet.)

Once neurological damage and bone fractures have been ruled out or managed, we can begin treatment of dentoalveolar (teeth and associated bone) injuries. We consider pharmacological therapy at this evaluation, such as antibiotics, anti-inflammatories, steroids, a tetanus booster, and secondary treatment.

Early diagnosis and treatment improve outcome. We regularly see cases that, if not evaluated at the time of trauma, would lead to progression of the existing trauma. There are cases where a significant injury is not diagnosed until well after the accident. Diego, a 9-year-old boy, got a bruise on his chin after falling off his bike. He was examined about 10 days later because he was having trouble chewing. The day after that, he was in surgery having a jaw fracture set and

Even when only minor injuries seem apparent, orofacial trauma needs immediate attention. A bruise under the tongue points to a mandibular fracture; a "black eye" can mask fractured orbital bone; copious nose-bleeding can mean fractured maxillary, nasal or base-of-skull bones; and bruising behind the ear can be related to base-of-skull fracture. Further, major injuries like mandibular fracture have a well-documented association to cervical spine injury.

#### Rapid treatment saves teeth

Delaying treatment of dental injuries can lead to permanent tooth loss. Avulsed permanent teeth should be replanted and wire-splinted immediately. The prognosis worsens with every minute out of the socket. Madeline was 9 when she lost her upper front tooth after jumping off her bed. Fortunately, her mother found the tooth and called her dentist ... two days later. Sadly, the window of opportunity for a reasonably healthy prognosis had long since passed. Today, Madeline is 13, and her traumatized and root-canal-treated permanent front tooth is loose. It likely will be lost completely in less than a year, which is not a pretty picture for this young adolescent. Upper front teeth are involved in most orofacial injuries and carry great potential for pain, psychological effect and economic implications. Lifetime costs of treatment and follow up care of one avulsed permanent tooth is \$5,000 to \$20,000! Depending upon the extent of the traumatic injury and the child's age, injuries are managed in an office setting or in hospital.

#### Steps you can take

Some orofacial injuries are tough to prevent. Short of bubble-wrapping their kids, parents and school personnel can reduce the severity of sports-related trauma with a few important steps:

• Ensure that coaches enforce the use of helmets, face masks and mouth guards, as applicable to the sport. Team uniformity is particularly important in adolescence, when peer pressure is so substantial. Costs are negligible relative to treatment fees, so it makes sense to favor the odds of wearing protective gear.

- Parents should require helmet use when children are skiing or riding bikes and scooters.
- Conscientious changes to physical environments at school and home, such as loose-fill surface materials under swings and climbing structures, can reduce incidence of some accidents. Children should be clearly visible to adults on the playground. School policies against bullying and violence also contribute to fewer injuries.
- The Dental Trauma app, for iPhones and iPads, and Dental Trauma First Aid app for Androids, are quick to navigate in an emergency.
- Preservation medium for an avulsed tooth, such as EMT ToothSaver, should be part of every first aid kit in homes, schools and at sporting events. Your pediatric dentist should carry this solution.
- Seek immediate emergency care when trauma occurs. The value of early diagnosis is worth repeating.
- Finally, regarding severe trauma, do not allow a child to eat or drink. Fasting for sedation or general anesthesia may be required.
- Even with all this caution, the livin' can be easy this summer. Learn to sensibly control the risk of orofacial trauma, so that you can continue to relish and savor summertime activities with your kids.
