VOLUME 6: ORTHO IS NOT JUST FOR STRAIGHTENING TEETH

Many parents pursue orthodontic treatment for their son or daughter because they want their child to have “straight teeth”. This is a worthy goal, but not necessarily the best nor only reason for seeking orthodontic care. There are so many other benefits to move teeth into alignment and fix the bite.

1: EASIER TO KEEP TEETH CLEAN

When teeth are misaligned, bacteria can hide in the nooks and crannies where the teeth overlap. Even with good brushing and flossing, these areas can be missed allowing for the build-up of plaque and tartar and can lead to decalcification or tooth decay.

2: REDUCES WEAR AND POTENTIAL DAMAGE TO TEETH

Teeth are designed to fit together like gears. When that gearing is off front-to-back or side-to-side, excessive wear can occur. This damage can lead to worn enamel, hypersensitivity, or fracture of a cusp tip and can be expensive repairs.

3: HELPS AVOID JAW PROBLEMS

Issues with the jaw joint and surrounding muscles can sometimes be correlated with an unfavorable relationship between the top and bottom teeth. A significant malocclusion can add undue stress



beyond the teeth. Issues can arise such as popping, clicking, locking of the temporomandibular joint, headaches and chronic muscle pain.

4: IMPROVES GUM & BONE HEALTH

Crooked teeth can make it more difficult to keep them clean and free of bacteria/plaque. This can lead to cavities or irritate the gums resulting in gingivitis. If the infection persists long enough, gingivitis will progress to periodontitis which can cause bone loss and loose teeth.

5: ALLOWS FOR CLEARER SPEECH

Teeth and the jaw relationship play a big role in producing certain sounds needed for clear speech. When a child has a large overbite, open bite, or significant gaps between their front teeth, sounds that begin with the letter(s), “s”, “sh” or “th” may be difficult to pronounce. A narrow maxillary arch may inhibit proper tongue position which can have an impact not only on speech, but also on swallowing and mouth breathing.

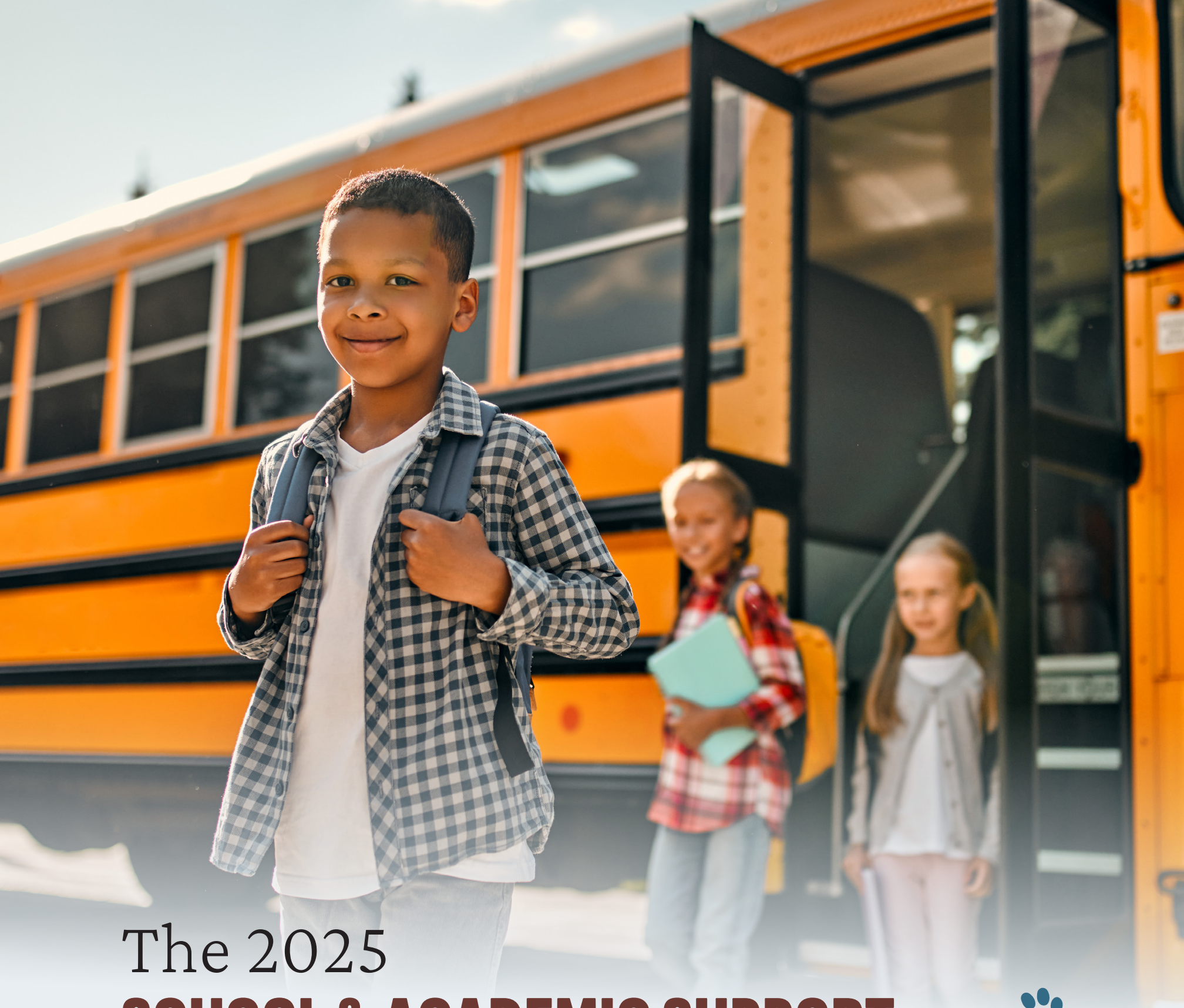

The college experience



Taeya Padilla is a senior at New Mexico State University.

When people ask me where I go to school, I cannot help but feel a deep sense of pride to call myself a New Mexico State University Aggie. To say “guns up!” is more than just a phrase, it’s a feeling of accomplishment. The endless possibilities NMSU provides made me into the person I am today.

I am a senior at NMSU, double majoring in communication studies and journalism with minors in sports marketing, marketing, advertising, and strategic communication. During my time at NMSU, I have been able to dabble in different fields, attend workshops, gain valuable experience in public relations, and build close relationships.

As a freshman, I had the opportunity to live in Piñon Hall. Although the feeling of leaving home was terrifying, it was the start of a new chapter. When my parents dropped me off, I remember sitting on my bed thinking, what now? But as I met new people and fell in love with the Organ Mountains, I started to think of Las Cruces as home.

My first semester, I was a double major in fashion merchandising and design and business. I learned everything from making clothes to economics and accounting. NMSU provided me with weekly tutoring in accounting—and provides that for all degree paths. Toward the end of the semester, I decided to switch my major to communication studies because fashion was not my passion. I had no idea what I wanted a career in.

The next semester, I was captivated by communications. I found another home within the department of communication studies. Greg Armfield, department head and professor, welcomed me with open arms and had a huge influence on my academics and career. The small class sizes helped me develop meaningful relationships

with my professors and make lifelong friends. Assistant professor Gabriella Morales gave me the opportunity to lead hour-long facilitations and treated all her students with an enviable kindness. The professors and students in the department make you excited to get up and go to class.

A class that really stood out to me in the department was Communication and Culture. It taught me the importance of knowing how diverse cultures communicate and helped me apply communication theories to my own life. Family and interpersonal communication also helped me to become more self-aware. I realized how my communication style was impacting my life and how I could break negative communication patterns.

As a sophomore, I was getting paid to go to school. My scholarships were covering full tuition, and I received money for my living expenses. I added sports marketing and journalism minors and interned with NMSU

Athletics as a media relations intern for an academic year. I took pictures for multiple sporting events, posted on social media platforms, wrote press releases and was highly involved with Aggie Athletics. Having a press pass and sitting on the basketball court filming Instagram highlights were unique experiences that not many college students have. Feeling the wins and losses from the Aggie perspective helped me build a connection to NMSU’s fan base, the NMSU Athletics Department and athletes I was covering.

Toward the end of my sophomore year, my parents found out they were expanding our family and having a baby. Although unconventional, I was able to take all of my courses online for my junior fall semester, help my family and stay on track to graduate. One of the greatest qualities NMSU has is its community-oriented culture. The faculty and staff at NMSU are student-centered and care for the well-being of their students. They do everything in their power to accommodate students.

In my junior spring semester, I added marketing and advertising minors and was hired by the NMSU Marketing and Communications office as its student news writer. This office is great at taking care of its student employees and helping them reach their goals. My position as a student news writer mainly included writing news releases for the NMSU Newsroom. With this job came the responsibility of interviewing professors and faculty, sending professional emails and sometimes taking pictures for the NMSU News social media accounts. I was given the opportunity to write stories for NMSU’s College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences magazine and the College of Business annual report. NMSU offers student jobs in different departments to help students advance their careers and reach their goals.

In addition to my job at NMSU, Armfield recommended me for an internship with the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico. The Foundation is a nonprofit organization and serves 12 counties across southern New Mexico. They hold 300 endowments, offer more than 40 scholarships and nine annual grant cycles. I worked as the social media and special events intern for two semesters. When representing CFSNM at meetings, events or conferences,

I was able to confidently answer questions and offer my perspective because of the public speaking skills I gained at NMSU.

My senior year, I added a journalism major with a minor in strategic communication and joined the American Marketing Association. I attended two workshops in my senior fall semester with the support of two professors.

Richard Coltharp, long-time journalist and adjunct professor, encouraged me to apply for the New Mexico Press Association College Journalism Workshop during NMPA’s annual convention. This was a great opportunity where I was able to network with journalists from across the state and publish three articles in the Shop Talk newspaper and on NMPA’s website. My experience was similar to a day in the life of a journalist. I interviewed Old Town Albuquerque business owners and visitors, learned how to take outdoor photographs and wrote stories on tight deadlines.

Erin Baca Blaugrund, AMA faculty adviser and marketing professor, coordinated the Teaching Business Ethics Workshop Case Competition and invited me to attend. The workshop focused on analyzing an ethical dilemma. With a group of six people from schools across New Mexico and Colorado, we were tasked with analyzing the case and presenting our decision to a panel of judges, faculty and the other teams. My team and I took third place, which was a big accomplishment for me.

Not only does NMSU go above and beyond in academics, but NMSU excels in extracurriculars and student engagement. My four years at NMSU have been the best years of my life. I attended morning yoga at the activity center, football tailgates, career fairs, sporting events, activity fairs and an alumni dinner. My favorite memories are doing my homework and having picnics in the grass, fishing in the Alumni Pond, joining AMA, working with my best friends, hiking the Organs, admiring the Las Cruces sunsets, living with my best friend in the dorms and late-night frozen custard runs. I couldn’t think of a better place to attend college. NMSU has truly captured my heart.

Dual Credit at Santa Fe Community College

In today's fast-evolving academic landscape, students are increasingly looking for ways to jumpstart their college experience while still in high school. Dual credit programs, such as the one offered by Santa Fe Community College (SFCC), provide an invaluable opportunity for motivated high school students to earn college credits, build a stronger academic foundation, and ease the transition to post-secondary education. This program empowers students by enabling them to complete college-level coursework, often at little to no cost, while simultaneously satisfying high school graduation requirements. SFCC's dual credit program provides a range of benefits, including financial savings and improved career preparation, which help students achieve their educational goals more efficiently.

Dual credit programs allow high school students to enroll in college courses and earn both high school and college credits simultaneously. At SFCC, dual credit courses are designed to align with high school curriculum standards while meeting the rigorous academic expectations of college-level coursework. Participating students can take courses in various subjects, including English, math, science, humanities, and career-specific programs, enabling them to explore academic interests or focus on fields relevant to their career goals.

One of the distinguishing aspects of dual credit at SFCC is that students can take courses either on the SFCC campus, online, or at their own high schools, depending on the specific arrangement between SFCC and the high school. This flexibility in delivery allows students to manage their schedules better and select a learning environment that best suits their individual needs.

One of the most appealing aspects of the dual credit program is the financial savings it offers. At SFCC, tuition for dual credit students is waived, making this a cost-effective way to earn college credits. Given the rising cost of college tuition, the ability to complete several college courses often for free or only the cost of additional course-specific fees can substantially reduce the financial burden on students and their families.

By earning college credits in high school, dual credit students can reduce the time it takes to complete a college degree. Some students can even enter college with enough credits to qualify as sophomores, allowing them to graduate in less time than their peers. This early start can be particularly valuable for students with clear academic or career goals, as they can focus on

advanced courses sooner and enter the workforce earlier.

Transitioning from high school to college is a significant adjustment, but dual credit programs can ease this transition by familiarizing students with the rigor and expectations of college coursework. SFCC's dual credit courses require critical thinking, time management, and self-motivation—skills that are essential for success in college and beyond. By mastering these skills in high school, dual credit students gain the confidence and readiness needed to thrive in a college environment.

Dual credit courses at SFCC also provide students with a unique opportunity to explore potential career paths. SFCC offers a range of courses tailored to career and technical fields, allowing students to gain hands-on experience and industry-relevant skills. Fields such as healthcare, welding, and film are popular options for students who are considering careers in these areas. Additionally, career-specific dual credit courses can help students make informed decisions about their career choices before they fully commit to a particular field of study.

In many cases, dual credit courses can boost a student's high school GPA. High school transcripts that feature college-level courses can also be beneficial when applying to colleges. Admissions officers often view dual credit participation as a sign of academic ambition, maturity, and readiness for college, which can strengthen a student's application and improve their chances of acceptance into competitive programs.

To be eligible for SFCC's dual credit program, students typically need to be enrolled in a participating high school and meet specific academic prerequisites, which may vary depending on the course.

Students must meet with their high school counselor to discuss the dual credit options available and determine which courses align with their academic and career goals. Parental approval is also required, as it ensures that families are fully informed and supportive of the student's dual credit journey.

I want to pause here for a moment and share that as a professional who has been working with dual credit students at SFCC for more than a decade, I have seen how this program can affect the very trajectory of a student's life. A few years ago, when visiting a Santa Fe High School classroom to introduce the program to students, I had the opportunity to meet a student who

was, by his own admission, a mediocre student and fairly disengaged from school. Together SFCC Dual Credit Specialist Niki McKay and I convinced him to take a dual credit course. He then continued working one-on-one with Niki, who helped him identify the right course and encouraged him through the registration process to the first day of class. He took and completed a Culinary Arts course. It would become the first on the road to his associate degree, which he completed in 2023. The dual credit experience not only introduced him more fully to the career he would pursue, but it also created relevance for all his other courses in high school as he began to see and understand their connection to his future. He was a high performer in his dual credit classes and improved in all his other courses. One of the most rewarding days for me in the last few years was when his mother found Niki and me to say “thank you” as she and her son, in cap and gown, arrived for Commencement. It was wonderful to celebrate his accomplishment.

I also know that his story is not unique. We have seen this happen for many of our dual credit students who discover themselves and their future because of this opportunity.

Many students who have participated in SFCC’s dual credit program have gone on to achieve remarkable success in college and their careers. For example, some dual credit alumni have completed their associate degrees within one year of high school graduation, giving them a competitive edge in the job market or a solid foundation for transferring to four-year institutions.

Dual credit at Santa Fe Community College offers a powerful pathway for high school students to begin their college education early, build essential skills, and gain exposure to potential career paths. The financial, academic, and personal benefits of the program empower students to take control of their futures, laying a strong foundation for lifelong learning and success. As SFCC’s dual credit program continues to grow, it will undoubtedly help more students realize their academic and career goals, shaping a brighter future for the next generation.
