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

## What Breaks Us, Builds Us: Notes from a Year of Grief, Grace, and Growth

I've taken a pause from writing. A long one. A full year, in fact.

For someone whose life has been built on stories—sharing them, shaping them, seeking them—this silence was unfamiliar territory. But life doesn't ask for permission to knock us down. It just does. And sometimes, the only response is to sit in the rubble for a while, catch your breath, and begin the slow, uneven work of rebuilding.

Last spring, in May 2024, everything changed. My mom fell and broke her back in three places. She was already in the grips of dementia, and the trauma pushed her condition into rapid decline. My father, loving and loyal, couldn't manage the medical complexities, the daily demands, and the emotional weight on his own. I stepped in as her primary caregiver.

And while we were still figuring out the logistics of appointments and therapies, of medications and memory loss, the unthinkable happened. My Aunt Susanmy mom's sister-in-law—was killed in a tragic boating accident in Alaska. A commercial fishing boat collided with the smaller vessel she and my uncle were on. She never made it out. Her body was recovered later, still inside the boat.

I don't know how to describe the kind of grief that stacks like that—how heartbreak collides with helplessness, how time starts to lose shape when your days are filled with hospitals, funeral planning, and blank stares from someone you love who no longer remembers.

For months, we waited to see if my mother's spine would heal naturally.

## Heartbreak and Healing A LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

She refused to wear the neck brace. I can't say I blame her. When your mind is already fading, discomfort is intolerable in ways no medical chart can measure. Plus, she kept forgetting her back was broken. The spine didn't heal, and in December, she underwent major surgery. The next day, her organs began shutting down. She was rushed into emergency surgery again. Test after test ruled out the usual suspects-stroke, clots, infection. Finally, a rare diagnosis: serotonin syndrome.

Two back-to-back surgeries on a body and brain already battling dementia had devastating consequences. My mother had to relearn how to walk, talk and how to use a straw again. Her recovery has been long, painful, and ongoing. Today, she lives in a memory care unit, where she often tries to escape. She believes she's back in high school, fluttering with nerves about the new boy who caught her eye—my father. She asks me daily if he likes her, if he wants to date her. And daily, he visits and reminds her—gently, lovingly—that they've been married for over fifty years. He tells her the stories she's forgottenthe births, the road trips, the little arguments and the big victories—and she listens as if they're fairy tales. The next day, my dad starts all over again. She does not remember.

In the middle of this collapse, I stepped away from public service. I couldn't be the leader I wanted to be while trying to hold my family together. I was exhausted-mentally, emotionally, spiritually. I was also ashamed. I felt like I was burdening those I loved. I couldn't fix the problem. I couldn't outrun it. And as someone used to solving problems for others, that was a hard truth to swallow.

So, I got help. I started counseling. I asked for grace. I made space in my days for what was essential—and left the rest to

wait. I poured myself into the parts of life I could still shape.

And in the darkness, there were lights.

Aviva, my spirited daughter, had her first dance recital. She beamed on that stage in her tutu, reveling in the spotlight, full of joy. She graduated from pre-K, proudly showing me her artwork and singing her favorite songs. Ryker, now a confident first grader, learned to play chess—something I didn't expect would capture his attention—and he finished the year with straight A's. Justin, my husband, has leaned into his own entrepreneurship and is thriving, building with passion and purpose. And my dad, who once looked so lost, has found a new rhythm in his dayspeaceful steadiness I admire deeply.

As for me—I'm writing again.

It feels tentative, like learning to walk again. But I'm here, and I'm grateful.

Summer is now upon us. For so many parents, it's a time of transition—of looser schedules and later bedtimes, of sticky popsicles and impromptu adventures. For me, it also serves as a gentle reminder that breaks are not only allowed—they are essential.

Our children are watching us. They learn not just from our productivity, but from our pauses. They learn that grief is not weakness. That caregiving is not failure. That setting down something heavy so you can breathe again is not quitting. It's human. It's healthy. It's how we survive.

In this issue of Tumbleweeds, you'll find stories of summer that are playful, messy, and hopeful. Discover how summer gives teachers at the Santa Fe Girls School the recharge they need for a new school year, and meet a brother-and-sister duo from "School of Rock" who are rockin' out with rhythm and confidence. You'll also read

about a father and son rediscovering connection through a childhood hobby—chess—and how it's become a screen-free way to think ahead together. Alongside ideas for camps, family outings, and seasonal events, I hope you also find something deeper: permission to rest, to reset, and to reflect. Not every season is about growth. Some are about healing.

To those of you who are caregivers, who are grieving, who are rebuilding quietly and without applause—I see you. You're not alone.

And if you're in a season of joy, let yourself bask in it. Celebrate the small milestones. Soak in the giggles and the sun. Summer doesn't last forever, but the warmth it gives can carry us far through another school year.

Thank you for being part of this community. I'm honored to write to you again.

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

## What true confidence and self-esteem sound like

I love summer because it gives teachers time to recharge their passion and optimism for another school year. It gives us time to improve our curricula, consider how to spark interest using current events and trends, and prepare for the strengths, weaknesses, and interests of the individual students entering our classrooms next year.

I love teaching middle school; students are on the cusp of adulthood, hungry for knowledge, ready to face what is hard about the world, and still are interested in the wisdom teachers have to share. A huge inspiration for me as I return to my desk are my graduates' reflections. At the Santa Fe Girls' School, our graduates give speeches at graduation about how they have grown through the transformative years of middle school. Some common themes for graduates include finding their voices, valuing learning through failure or challenging experiences, letting go of

perfectionism, (re) discovering their love of learning, and creating and accepting their identities.

I would like to share two of my students' hopeful, happy, personal reflections. Paloma Rodriguez is 14 years old. She started at the Santa Fe Girls' School in sixth grade after attending our summer camp. She attended Gonzales Community School previously, and will be attending Santa Fe High School in the fall. A highlight of her eighth-grade year was a yearlong capstone research project in which she got to research, write about, and present on jellyfish. Paloma is also a keen poet and is interested in politics and activism, in addition to her passion for all things STEM.

### From Paloma:

"I was once a second grader who cried in the empty classroom surrounded by ladybugs and paper periwinkle stars. Salty tears ran down my raw, red face and landed on a crumpled division worksheet at my feet, along with a pencil riddled with teeth marks. One clear thought was able to permeate my distress-clouded brain: "I hate math." My resistance to the subject stayed with me for years. As my body grew, my attitude stayed as that of my second-grade self, opposed to even the thought of math. I wanted to yell and sob at anyone who attempted to help me.

"While my family can attest to this depiction of my younger self, it may come as a surprise to many of my current classmates. To use the language of my beloved math teacher, Ms. Hill, I am now known as quite the math whiz. But this nickname was earned after hard work. My experience at the Santa Fe Girls' School has transformed me from having a closed mind to an open one. It took my least favorite subject and, with careful explanation and patience, helped build my confidence until math was morphed into an integral part of my identity: one that I will carry with me.

"The world that lies ahead of me today is one that I see through the lens of logical, predictable patterns. I now see every series of problems like an endless rabbit hole I can dive into with as much awe, curiosity, and passion as if I were researching the stars, or the Ottoman Empire, or one of my dear jellyfish. This is the philosophy that the Girls' School has instilled in me. This is the person they have helped me become.

Aniella Porak de Varna is also 14 years old. Aniella was at Acequia Madre School, looking at the Girls' School as a seventh-grade option, when she decided to come midway through her sixth-grade year. She will attend Santa Fe Preparatory School in the fall. A highlight for Aniella this year was speaking at the State Legislature, when the eighth grade lobbied for two climate change bills. Aniella loved preparing for and speaking in front of a Senate Committee. Aniella is looking forward to speech and debate in high school, and particularly enjoys the challenges of essay writing and research projects.

### From Aniella:

"Women of the jury, Shakespeare is guilty." I delivered my speech with conviction. At that moment, I was a lawyer. I held the power. All eyes were on me, and I knew what I said and how I said it mattered. I squared my shoulders and faced the jury of my peers. I met their eyes and did not back down.

"In English this year, we held a court case and put Shakespeare on trial. As soon as I started speaking, I felt confident and powerful.

"Two and a half years ago, I would not have been able to. I would have been nervous, timid, shy, afraid of

losing, and above all, worried about what other people would think of me and my opinions.

"For years, I watched in wonder as the older kids at school spoke in front of crowds, wishing I could be like them. But I doubted myself and what I had to say. I had no idea how they could be so confident.

"Throughout my time at the Santa Fe Girls' School, I have learned that the older kids I admired didn't just say what came to them at that moment: they prepared. I learned that preparation is the key to success. Those students had done their research and knew their information held value. They had to teach themselves before they could teach others. But they, and I, did not have to do it alone. I had dedicated, passionate teachers who helped me learn; I had parents who encouraged me every step of the way; I had classmates who worked alongside me. Nonetheless, to reach that goal, I had to take the steps myself. I was the one who pursued, persevered, and risked putting myself out there. And once I was brave enough to finally speak, I felt powerful and passionate.

"That day, as I delivered my case before my peers, I did not win, but I learned something far more valuable. I learned that what I say matters. I learned that my classmates value my voice. I learned that, with preparation, I can be confident and successful. The outcome of the court case did not matter! I walked out a person sixth-grade-me would be proud of."

## Lo que dice Paloma

Lágrimas resbalaban por mi cara pura, roja y caían en una hoja de trabajo para hacer divisiones arrugada a mis pies, junto a un lápiz plagado de marcas de dientes. Un pensamiento claro pudo extenderse en mi cerebro nublado de angustia: "Odio las matemáticas". Mi resistencia a la materia estuvo conmigo por años. Conforme mi cuerpo creció, mi actitud permaneció como la de mi ser en el segundo grado, opuesta hasta a la idea de las matemáticas. Quería gritarle a cualquiera que intentara ayudarme; quería sollozar.

"Mientras mi familia puede dar testimonio de esta imagen de cuando yo era más joven, podría sorprender a muchas de mis compañeras de clase en la actualidad. Para usar las palabras de mi querida maestra de matemáticas, la Srta. Hill, ahora se me conoce como genio de las matemáticas. Pero ese apelativo fue resultado de mucho trabajo. Mi experiencia en Santa Fe Girls' School me ha transformado de tener una mente cerrada a una abierta. Tomó la materia que menos me gustaba y, con explicaciones cuidadosas y paciencia, me ayudó a sentirme con confianza hasta que las matemáticas se volvieron una parte integral de mi identidad: parte que siempre llevaré conmigo

El mundo que me espera hoy en día lo veo a través de los lentes de patrones predecibles y lógicos. Ahora veo una serie de problemas como una madriguera de conejo interminable en la cual puedo profundizar con tanto deslumbramiento, curiosidad y pasión como que si estuviera investigando las estrellas, o el Imperio otomano, o una de mis queridas medusas. Ésta es la filosofía que Girls' School me ha inculcado. Ésta es la persona en quien me han ayudado a convertirme"

Aniella Porak de Varna también tiene 14 años de edad. Aniella estaba en la escuela Acequia Madre y tenía Girls' School como opción para el séptimo grado, cuando decidió cambiar de escuela como a medio año del sexto grado. Asistirá a Santa Fe Preparatory School en el otoño. Para Aniella un hito este año fue hablar en la legislatura estatal, cuando su octavo grado cabildeó por dos propuestas legislativas sobre el cambio climático. Le gustó prepararse para su presentación ante el comité del senado. Anticipa con entusiasmo participar en oratoria y debate en la preparatoria y, particularmente, disfruta los desafíos de escribir ensayos y la investigación de proyectos.



Aprendí que, con preparación, puedo sentirme segura y tener éxito. ¡El resultado de la causa judicial no importaba! Salí de ahí una persona de sexto grado de quien yo estaba orgullosa.

Why kids should get excited about chess

Like many people, I played chess as a kid. I learned how the pieces move and played fairly often, mostly with my dad, just for something fun to do when I had free time. Chess, like life, seems so simple at first, but as you keep playing you notice all the layers and complications. We can also make things more complicated than they need to be, too. There also isn't one right way to play or one correct way to live your life. I didn't know it then, but chess would be a big part of my life, and I would learn a lot from the game.

It didn't take long for me to start beating my dad, so we started looking for stronger competition. My dad saw a notice in the newspaper about a local tournament and signed me up for it. I was the only kid there and I lost all

of my games, but it was still fun. We signed up for more tournaments and I was hooked. It was fun, I enjoyed the competition, and hey, I got to be pretty good at it.

Now that I am older and have kids of my own, I realized that this silly board game taught me a lot. I stopped playing for about 20 years, but picked it back up a few years ago just before the pandemic started. When things shut down, I had a lot of time to dive back into playing chess. I currently coach the chess club at my children's school and it's interesting to see how this new generation is learning many of the same lessons I learned. I would like to share with you some of the many important lessons that children (and adults) can learn from this great game.

First, since this is a game between two players, the game ends with a winner and loser, or it can be a draw (tie). Unfortunately, no one can win every game, so it's important to learn how to accept losing. This isn't easy for grown-ups, either, so practicing how to get over disappointment and learn from it is something that will help our kids in the future when they strike out in baseball, drop a pass in football, get a low grade on a math test, when they apply for colleges, or face challenges at the job, among countless other situations that life will throw at them. One of my mantras that I tell my students is, "It doesn't matter if you fail at something, what matters is how you react to it." This means that mistakes are going to happen, and that's OK, but we want to try to learn from our mistakes. This is a big lesson that chess can help teach us about life.

The flip side of dealing with losing is, of course, winning. It's just as important

to learn how to win graciously. No one likes to lose, and it's even harder if the other person rubs it in or makes the other person feel worse. I have had countless students who start cheering when they capture their opponent's piece, but I remind them how they felt when the same thing happened to them a few minutes earlier. This is a good way to teach empathy, because the kids can put themselves in the position of their opponent or remember how they felt when they lost the previous game.

When I tell people that I play chess, the first question is almost always, How many moves ahead can you see? I usually just respond with oh, I don't know. I say this not to be coy, but because it depends on a lot of factors. There are dozens and dozens of possible moves at every moment of a chess game, but we can reduce this number by using logic and understanding consequences. This is another great lesson that children can

learn from playing. While I could trade my queen for a pawn (this is usually a bad idea, since the queen is more valuable), I need to understand that this won't help me win the game. If a child can begin to understand what will happen after a move, they are becoming more aware as rational little people. My daughter could put her dirty dish under her bed, but it would be much more helpful if she put it in the dishwasher.

Along those lines, chess teaches us that our actions have consequences, both positive and negative. If we move a piece, then maybe it gets captured or maybe we can take our opponent's piece. One aspect of chess that I enjoy is that everything is out in the open—that is, all the pieces are on the board and our opponent sees the same things we do. This is different from card games or other board games where some information is hidden. The position on the chess board helps kids learn to make the best decision possible based on the information available, but also be willing to adjust their views later, based on how things change over the course of the game. This helps kids learn how to make logical decisions

and also not be locked into one view or choice depending on the situation. A bad move now might be a good move later in the game, just like having ice cream for breakfast probably isn't a healthy choice, but having it after a balanced dinner can be a nice treat.

Chess has taught me all of these life lessons and more. It is easy to get caught up in winning and losing and the competition, but sometimes I have to remind myself and my students that it is just a game. So, pull your chess set out of the closet and show your child how to play. You both might practice some valuable life skills. But at the very least, you will have some good bonding time without looking at a screen.



Joining forces to grow volunteerism, support students, and strengthen community ties

To demonstrate the impact of what can be accomplished through local collaboration, Santa Fe Public Schools (SFPS) and the City of Santa Fe's Office of Economic Development have combined resources to expand and enhance the SFPS volunteer program. This partnership reflects a unified vision centered on student success, lifelong learning, and building a stronger, more connected community.

Through a generous investment from the city, SFPS has been able to hire contracted staff to significantly increase the capacity of its volunteer program. With this added support, SFPS can now implement the SFPS Volunteer Program 2024–2027 Strategic Plan by strengthening infrastructure to support and match community volunteers with roles that

best suit their interests, schedules, and areas of expertise.

These combined resources enable the expansion of several key initiatives, including the creation of volunteer District committees, school site volunteer teams, and operational support for the Help U Homework Hotline—a free, virtual tutoring program that connects SFPS students with volunteer tutors for academic support across a range of subjects. The hotline has proven particularly valuable for students who may need flexible, one-on-one support beyond the traditional classroom setting and allows a virtual platform for students who aren't able to stay after school due to transportation obstacles. In addition, the volunteer program has expanded onboarding and support systems for both new and returning

volunteers, making the experience more accessible and rewarding for all involved.

"This collaboration with the City of Santa Fe has been a game-changer for our volunteer program," said Sabra Romero, SFPS volunteer coordinator. "With this added support, we've been able to expand opportunities for community members to engage meaningfully with our studentswhether that's through virtual tutoring, school site and classroom assistance, or student mentorship. We're seeing firsthand how volunteers with varied backgrounds are making a real difference in our schools. It's about more than just helping in the classroom. It's about building relationships that inspire learning and community connection."

SFPS serves a student body with a diverse set of needs, and recognizes that academic achievement is often enhanced when students receive personalized attention by incorporating a whole-child approach. Volunteers are able to provide personalized care and attention to physical, mental, cognitive, and social-emotional well-being in addition to academic achievement.

In recent years, many school systems have faced challenges in maintaining robust volunteer programs due to legal administrative requirements, restricted budgets, the lasting impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, or the evolving needs of students and families. This partnership aims to address these challenges head-on. By building the internal capacity to better manage, train, and support volunteers, SFPS can now more effectively engage a wider community range, including young adults, parents, family members, retirees, and professionals who may be seeking ways to give back or connect with local schools and children.

"This investment in people and infrastructure allows us to meet volunteers where they are—whether that's someone who can give an hour a week virtually or someone who wants to be present in a classroom several days a month," Romero said. "Flexibility and purpose are key to successful recruitment and retention."

One of the most inspiring examples of the program's impact comes from a longtime volunteer, Dr. Julanna Gilbert, a retired post-secondary chemistry professor from the University of Denver. When Gilbert and her husband relocated to Santa Fe, they were both interested in contributing their gift of time to educational programs within their community.

Gilbert began offering her volunteer services in 2017 by supporting math teachers and students at Santa Fe High School during the school day. Since then she has supported the Services for Advanced and Gifted Education (SAGE) program as a career mentor, she has helped students virtually in math and science through the Help U Homework Hotline and most recently,

she has supported Community School Coordinator, Tommy Rodriguez by tutoring at Santa Fe High School during the after school tutoring program at that school site. Students look forward to their time with Gilbert, and her experience and warmth have made her an invaluable addition to the learning environment.

"It is very rewarding to serve as a volunteer in the public schools here in Santa Fe," Gilbert said. "I truly enjoy the opportunity to work with students. When a student tells me that they are stuck and don't know how to do their homework, we work together to find a related topic that they do understand, and then to discover the missing link in their thinking. We both rejoice when they can connect with the new material."

Gilbert's story is just one of many that illustrate how the volunteer program is opening doors for intergenerational connections and deepening the ties between schools and the broader community.

The expansion of the SFPS volunteer program is not just an educational initiative—it's a community development strategy. The Office of Economic Development sees the initiative as a natural extension of its mission to support workforce development and long-term prosperity in Santa Fe.

"Education and economic development go hand in hand—when we invest in our students, we invest in the future of Santa Fe," said Johanna Nelson, the City of Santa Fe's director for the Office of Economic Development. "By expanding volunteer capacity, this partnership helps provide students and teachers with the support they need while creating meaningful opportunities for community members to give back. We're excited for this collaboration and hopeful it will have

a positive impact on our schools and our community."

The City's investment is more than just financial—it's symbolic of a city that recognizes the value of public education and the role that engaged citizens can play in shaping future generations.

Mayor Alan Webber also emphasized the long-term significance of this partnership. "Our partnership with Santa Fe Public Schools is essential for the future of our city," Webber said. "Nothing is more important than the skills, learning, and life experiences of Santa Fe's young people. Working together with SFPS, the City is committed to doing everything we can to invest in our youth, because learning and earning go hand in hand."

Looking ahead, SFPS plans to continue growing its volunteer base while expanding program offerings to meet the evolving needs of students and educators. SFPS is exploring additional ways to leverage the talents of local artists, STEM professionals, bilingual volunteers, and other community members whose contributions can enhance classroom learning and the lives of our students.

SFPS also intends to track the program's impact more closely—both quantitatively and qualitatively—through feedback from students, teachers, and volunteers. Early responses have already been overwhelmingly positive, with many teachers reporting improved student engagement and volunteers expressing a desire to continue long-term.

With the support of the City of Santa Fe, SFPS is not only enhancing educational outcomes but also weaving a stronger social fabric throughout the community. In classrooms, over video calls, and at school events, volunteers are making a tangible difference – one student, one conversation, and one act of kindness at a time.

Understanding the importance of music in our lives

There's an old expression: Before we walk, we dance; before we talk, we sing; before we write, we draw. The artist lives deep within each of us, and our littles understand this perhaps better than we do.

The research is clear: Music matters in childhood development. Music is proven to be a powerful tool in brain development and self-regulation. In a world where we often experience overstimulation, music is a powerful tool to soothe. Music can be a tool for language development, using songs to introduce new words in a child's vocabulary. Music can be used to learn about emotions. Singing "If You're Happy and You Know It" accompanied by different facial expressions gives toddlers the opportunity to practice and recognize different emotions.

For school-aged kiddos, music classes are a crucial part of learning. Studies show that classrooms that use music during testing improves concentration and relieves test-anxiety. Using songs to teach a concept improves understanding and recall. How many of us adults remember the songs from Schoolhouse

Rock or perhaps the song listing our 50 states in alphabetical order?

In Santa Fe, we are lucky—our public school system continues to invest in music education. Our school board and administrative staff understand that kids need music in their lives. Schools across our district have beloved orchestra programs, guitar programs, band programs, and mariachi programs in addition to general music classes. Even more impressive, most of our elementary schools have multiple music educators on staff. In fact, Santa Fe Public Schools has been honored eight times with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from the NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education.

In other schools across our state and nation, students aren" so lucky. Music and other art programs are often cut due to lack of funding. Music might be available once a week after school as a club, or general education teachers bring instruments into their classrooms for specific units throughout the year. When selecting a school for your kiddo, it's important to select it for not just

academic achievement, but also for its arts programs. This becomes even more important if your kiddo struggles in traditional academic or social settings. Music can be a relief for many kids, especially those who are neurodivergent.

So now what? How can we advocate for our kids' music education or empower them to learn an instrument? For many of us, music is competing against our own childhood. Many parents did not have great music education growing up, and don't know where to begin. Or, perhaps you had a mean piano teacher who smooshed your fingers on the keys and made you practice scales over and over and over again. Why on earth would you want to subject your kiddo to that experience?

The first is to make music fun for you and your family. Stop and listen to the musician who is busking on the street. Hold impromptu, silly dance parties in the living room. Play music while you're driving and be sure to sing along so loudly that your kids roll their eyes at you. Go to free concerts throughout the summer at SWAN Park, the Railyard, or at the Santa Fe Children'' Museum. Sing lullabies with your loved ones at the end of the day. And, explore the myriad offerings of music programs in Santa Fe.

At Queen Bee Music Association, we begin music classes as early as possible. Our twice weekly Kids Sing Along classes for babies and toddlers are free to attend, thanks to the generosity of the Brindle Foundation. These classes are a great opportunity to not only get your kiddos moving and bopping along to music, but also to meet other parents and caregivers with young children.

For kids ages 5+, we host group classes on ukulele, percussion, singing, guitar, violin, and music production/songwriting. These group classes are held weekly after school during Fall, Winter, and Spring sessions. For young ones in particular, exploration is key. Don't expect your kiddo to pick an instrument and stick with it for life.

Sometimes it takes a while to find the instrument that resonates with them most. The most important thing is that they have fun, and music becomes something that they can use to express themselves, to self-soothe.

Learning an instrument takes time, and it's a great way to teach those soft skills around learning slowly: patience, perseverance, and concentration. Even spending five minutes a day playing an instrument, especially if it's time away from a screen.

Now after some exploration, you might find that you have a very musically inclined kiddo in your house. There are so many music programs in Santa Fe that can help keep that passion alive as your kid gets older. Our friends at Candyman Strings & Things host Summer Rock Camp for ages 8+, an incredible education in being in a rock band. Local songwriter Lucy Barna hosts a songwriting camp for girls ages 10 to 17. The Hummingbird Music Camp in the Jemez Mountains is celebrating its 67th summer season of sleep-away camps centered around band, orchestra, and choir. The Santa Fe Symphony hosts youth programs in orchestra, jazz, and mariachi. And at Queen Bee Music Association, our group classes continue for kids as they turn into teens, and then onto adulthood.

Now, a more personal note for you adults reading: I can't tell you how many people say to me, "Well I'm not musical" or "I had a teacher who told me I shouldn't ever sing in public." That teacher lied to

you. Humans are naturally musical. Just because you didn't become a classically trained violinist playing at Carnegie Hall does not mean that you should not participate in music. Music is for everyone. Sometimes you just need a little help getting back to your musical nature, and it's never too late to find that music again.

I highly recommend taking a music class throughout the week. It's a great way to decompress and forget about the world around us for an hour. If you're new to music, start with ukulele or singing. Ukuleles are the most accessible instrument, both in ease of playing and cost. And singing, well—that's your voice! Learning to love and empower your voice to sing out loud brings a sense of catharsis that is indescribable.

And remember, music is for everyone. Let's all play out loud a little more this year.

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

**Book Nook Feature** 

With the end of the summer season and thoughts of cooler weather that the fall brings, we as parents and caregivers are filled with excitement and anticipation for new beginnings for our children. The start of a new school year also promises fresh learning possibilities for our young children.

Welcome and gather around for storytelling time focused on a theme of new beginnings that starts today with the Tumbleweeds Book Nook. The narrative unfolds with fresh and inspiring perspectives for "spying" early math in everyday surroundings, routines, and books.

This theme celebrates and stimulates infants' and toddlers' creativity, positive mindset, and self-esteem, all while having fun. The characters in this story find math in the most unlikely places, hidden all around them and their families—in gardens with its attractive geometric shapes, yards and parks with space for messy water math activities, at grocery stores where numbers are on display in every isle, when preparing meals where counting, comparing quantities, and measuring are front and center, in doing laundry sorting by sizes

and shapes and making pairs, and when reading bedtime stories where children count their way to sweet dreams.

These opportunities enhance imaginative math play and contribute to the basic understanding of number sense and relationships as they group, sequence, make patterns that are accompanied by math talk when we use everyday words, such as: "Almost at the top or bottom," "Down, down, down," "two more," "often," "another step," and "totally" to name "a few." It turns out that there are multiple ways to make early math come alive. All we have to do is to embrace and intentionally take advantage of them with children.

Where does early math exposure start? Well, you know the answer. Families are our first teachers. This can't be overstated when it comes to math. Young children's formative learning experiences around math literacy, language, and attitudes are rooted in the family. The link between parent

involvement and school readiness and success are well established and intricately linked. It is within families that children learn to build math confidence and positive math attitudes as they witness what is said and done when parents are confronted with new dilemmas and challenges. How they arrive at solutions does not go unnoticed by their children.

As infants gradually begin to move their bodies, roll over, crawl, walk short distances while holding an adult's finger, or move from chair to chair, they are exploring their space while simultaneously learning math. To be specific: spatial relationships, understanding how objects relate to each, is a cornerstone of early math learning.

Let's extend opportunities for our eager learners with books and other materials. A few of my favorite books that enhance the understanding of spatial relationships come complete with engaging heroes, settings, and plots. They include Elenor May's Albert is Not Scared who is with His big sister at the amusement park with rides reminiscent of the best of summer, but he finds himself in the wrong line—find out what happens—Rosie's Walk by Pat Hutchins, Up, Down, and Around by Katherine Ayres, and for the upcoming fall season, Piggies in the Pumpkin Patch by Mary Peterson and Jennifer Rofe.

Let's build on the ideas presented with the Positional Box Word Game using favorite stuffed animals. When children are asked the question, "Where is the teddy bear?" Above, below, under, left, right of the box—you get the idea. They physically place the bear in that place relative to the box. This simple activity promotes positional and directional word learning in playful ways. This idea also can be enjoyed when reading the book Pete the Cat: The Wheels on the Bus by James Dean. And it can morph into Hide and Seek games of Where Is the Frog—on a lily pad, in the water, under the water, and children mimic the movement of frogs as they hop from one green paper lily pad to the next. Or even play hide and seek with Dean's Pete the Cat Plays Hide-And-Seek or Baby Faces Peekaboo! by Dawn Sirett.

The concept of receiving one or two more or one or two less of something—comparing and measuring stuffed animals, dolls, cars, or blocks and paring them with books like *Lia & Luis: Who Has More?* by Ana Crespo, *What Will Fit?* by Grace Lin, and *Crash! Boom! A Math Tale* by Robie H. Harris will reinforce these relationships that are presented in different situations, broadening understanding.

Learning foundational math relationships would not be complete without counting by twos, fives, and tens when singing songs, sorting shapes, and eating individual pieces of cereal. Ten in a Hurry: An Interactive Colors and Counting Book by Lo Cole, Captain Numero and Friends: Skip-Counting By 2, 5 by Danielle Welton-Boxley, or Two of Everything by Lily Toy Hong are all good choices. And part-part-whole relationships are fostered when

children build number trains with snap blocks and then take them apart or listen to Stuart Murphy's *Give Me Half*, which explores the idea of more, less and between, how to figure out ages, and shares a game to compare numbers. With these common everyday situations, young children explore numbers, visualize them in different contexts, and develop flexibility outside the traditional algorithms.

In today's story, caring and supportive adults interact with their children and ask engaging and thought-provoking questions; it is not our mission to get right answers from them, but to demonstrate that math is in their world. What do you see? What does this look like? Which one is your favorite and why? Adults often want to go to ask How many \_\_\_ do you have? because we think that is the way to teach-learn math.

Intentionally weaving math into routine tasks such as organizing toys as part of clean up, predicting what comes first, reciting when dressing one arm two arms, attaching a number to steps when walking up and down them, finding the numbers of keys on a ring and matching the one that opens the door (one-to-one correspondence), lining up play dough worms, or singing nursery rhymes and songs such as "1, 2, buckle my shoe," "Six little ducks went out one day," or "Over in the meadow" affords countless ongoing conversations and engagement with and for children. What is truly amazing is that they share their (math) ideas and then act on them. even when they are making towers with blocks or filling different sized contains during bath time.

Whether listening to a book being read, playing with toys, or making crafts, infant and toddlers are doing math without you even mentioning the word. The joy of math starts early where children are. This joy is powered by the curiosity of their exploratory nature. Math is easy to discover because it is embedded all around us. Young children have an intuitive sense for numbers, but this predisposition has to be nourished so it continues to flourish, which is our job as parents and caretakers, their first teachers

As our story comes to an end, the good news is that infants and toddlers already love math. Let's remember to continue to uncover math in all the strange places. The goal is to give children opportunities that offer possibilities to make sense of what they encounter. So, notice and celebrate math wherever you find it. As Robert A. Heinlein has pointed out, "When one teaches, two learn."

Creating space for yourself through a lens of reflection

A chronic challenge of parenthood is managing self-care. Kids, work, friends, community, exercise, relationships, neighbors, elderly parents, the list goes on—how do I fit in all the demands? Most of us know what we need to do: meditate, exercise, connect with friends, be out-of-doors, eat nutritious food. We don't need a list of what to do, we need time to do it. How do I make enough time to nurture my own emotional, physical, intellectual, and spiritual well-being? Quite simply, you can't make time. You are gifted 24 hours a day, not a minute more, not a minute less.

The better question might be, How do I manage priorities, so I have some time?

Maybe these questions can help you reflect on your life, consider your priorities, and assist you in sorting things out so you have more space within your 24-hour day to enjoy some self-care, some time to take a walk or a nap, read a book, breath deeply, sit

under a tree, connect with a friend, or participate in a sport.

## • Do you, or others, question your boundaries, that you need to say no more often?

Frequently the advice given is that a person needs to set boundaries, to say no. The boundaries that you set and announce to others, tend to be outside yourself. They can become rigid, brittle, and unbecoming. It might be healthier to consider that boundaries are a construct of identity. When you know yourself, you know your boundaries. You know what, when, and how things work for you so you can gracefully make decisions. You can say no without feeling guilty and also say yes with confidence and conviction. As Socrates said, Know Thyself. In knowing yourself, you will recognize what is critical to do or nice to do or what doesn't really have to be done so you have more bandwidth for taking care of yourself.

## • Is your parenting life a precarious balancing act between kids and work?

Maybe consider it a blend of commitments rather than a tenuous balancing act of one or the other. Constant balancing can be exhausting. It will likely be a blend that will never be perfect, a blend that creates 'good enough' in both arenas. Nobody is perfect and who wants to be a nobody, anyway?

## • Do you find your work life exhausting?

Often a person comes home from a day at work feeling very tired. The temptation is to check out by crashing on the couch, scrolling on your phone, watching TV, or having a beer. Consider whether it is physical or mental exhaustion. If it is mental fatigue, a few minutes of physical movement—stretching or walking—can help dissipate the tiredness.

## Can you spend time with your child by walking around the park while they are with you on their bicycle or roller skates?

Creating a regular time, a small ritual of moving when you and the children have all arrived home, can be fulfilling. Regardless of the weather, regardless of the tiredness, regardless of someone complaining, a brief time on a regular basis everyone goes out of doors together can foster deep connection. When both you and the kids are out of doors, taking in fresh air, moving even in small ways, life might be better. Even when it rains, the kids will learn that they never get so wet they can't get dry.

## • Do you prioritize being a spectator over being a participant?

Frequently parents will spend hours being a spectator at their children's practices, games, and rehearsals but struggle to find the time to take a brief walk for themselves. It can be as simple as walking around the soccer pitch.

Maybe join the event at half time? Can you prioritize the main performance over every rehearsal?

## Do you lose bandwidth, time, and your cool by trying to talk your kids out of bad behavior?

There are inevitable occasions when a child acts badly. Even when you cannot affirm a behavior you can always affirm the feeling that fuels it. Affirming the feeling and linking it to how it causes the behavior creates space for a child to move through the feeling which can interrupt the unacceptable actions. Notice, label, and affirm feelings, even when you cannot affirm behaviors. When a child is screaming and hitting their sibling for taking their toy, you can say, "I can see you are angry, and it is OK to be angry when something of yours is taken. It is not OK to hit.'

## • Do I own more stuff than what I need or want?

We are owned by what we own. Pare down on ownership. It will decrease stress and create space—mentally and physically—so you can enjoy some self-care.

## • Am I judgmental? Am I hard on myself?

Chances are you are not nearly as judgmental about others as you are about yourself. Children tend to learn more by what we do than what we say. Common self judgements include how we look or how much we weigh or how we perform at work. Negative self-talk comes across loud and clear, whether we say things aloud or not. Children seem to hear everything. Children are emotional sponges who tend to learn affectively more than cognitively. They pick up on when you are judging yourself.

## • Do you believe you have to be at every single one of your child's activities?

Attending every event is not necessarily a measure of good parenting. A touch of benign neglect intermittently can give your child

room to grow, self-explore, and gain resiliency. Of course, this is when it is developmentally appropriate. It might be interesting to hear your daughter's recount of a softball game that you didn't watch or your son's rundown of how the music recital went. Occasionally listen to their life through their sharing experience rather than through what you saw.

## • Do you believe in unconditional care and love?

Many parents do when it is about their children. Often parents struggle with this when it comes to themselves. Children learn by how we live, more than what we say. Actions speak louder than words. Children pick up on everything, even when we don't think they are listening. If you are physically active each day, even in a small way, likely you will be more accepting of yourself. Physical activity can build self-esteem and confidence.

## Do you want your children to grow up and be able to take care of themselves?

To model self-care might be the most meaningful gift we offer our children. Modeling is an invaluable parenting technique. Again, children learn more by how we live than what we say. Trying to change behaviors with words is like driving a car with its horn. You can honk all day long and never get out of the garage.

Be gentle with yourself. Make a small nudge in a healthy direction. You can do this.
